MEXICAN SENATE, SANS QUORUM, MAY NOT BE CONVENED

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 25 (AP)—Mexico's hectic congressional politics may result in the new congress, which convenes September 1, being without a senate, says El Universal Grafico. Until recently, declares the newspaper, it appeared probable that there would be two rival chambers of deputies, each claiming the right to function. At present this difficulty seems to have been smoothed over, although the electoral college is still attempting to decide contests over seats arising out of the July 4 elections. El Universal Grafico asserts that the senators declared to have been elected in 13 of Mexico's 27 states will not be accepted by the minority parties in the senate composing the "revolutionary democratic bloc" and that this will prevent a two-thirds quorum in the upper chamber without which the senate cannot meet. The newspaper adds in this event, the deputies will have to meet without a senate until President Calles calls special state elections for the choosing of new senators. Campillo Seyde, president of the permanent congressional commission, said today that the chamber of deputies will convene September 1 and function regardless of whether the senate meets or not.

Youth Kills Teacher In Brooklyn Restaurant

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP)—Overpowered by what he told police was a desire to kill the man with whom he studied philosophy, Emanuel Silverstein 19, entered a restaurant in Brooklyn today and struck Julius Calisch, 53, on the head with a hammer. It is charged, Calisch died while being taken to a hospital. The boy said he had studied with Calisch for the past two years. He was on the way to keep an appointment with him at the restaurant today, he said, when he stopped at a shoemaker's shop and deposited fifty cents for the loan of a hammer. Other patrons in the restaurant overpowered Silverstein after he struck Calisch and held him until police arrived.

JURORS WILL PROBE CRASH

ATLANTA, Ga. Aug. 25 (AP)—Bills of indictment in connection with the crash of the Bankers Trust company of Atlanta and the subsequent closing of nearly 100 small Georgia and Florida banking houses for which it acted as fiscal agent, were held today by Ed A. Stephens, assistant solicitor general for presentation to the special grand jury investigating the bankruptcy proceedings of the institution.

Meanwhile, bankruptcy proceedings against the Bankers Trust company of Jacksonville, Fla., were filed in Tallahassee, Fla., late yesterday by state comptroller Ernest Amos. Sixty per cent of the stock of the Jacksonville institution was owned by the Bankers Trust company of Atlanta, now in receivership, according to attorneys for the Georgia state banking department. Virtually all of this 60 per cent was personal property of W. D. Manley, president of the closed Atlanta banking house. The proceedings were explained as having been taken to conserve assets and protect depositors of the bank.

Flying Ace Injured When Plane Crashes

BELLFONTE, Pa. Aug. 25 (AP)—Lieut. Cyrus Bettis, army flying ace, missing since Monday, was found alive in the seven state mountains today and is in the Centre county hospital here in a serious but not critical condition.

The flier's left leg is broken, his skull is fractured in two places and he has severe lacerations on the face and head.

BELLFONTE, Pa. Aug. 25 (AP)—Lieutenant Cyrus K. Bettis, army flying ace, missing since Monday, was brought to the Centre county hospital today with a broken leg.

Whether the aviator suffered any other serious injuries couldn't be determined immediately. Because of his condition, he was not permitted to discuss his experiences.

A report from Lewisburg said the army flier was found on the north side of Jack Mountain, five miles from that town. A plane was seen to fall by a farmer's wife

and a search was made of the south side of the mountain yesterday without success. Later two young farmers found the wrecked plane on the north side on a flat area of ground.
