## Modern Styles Tend Toward Healthfulness

(By The Associated Press) Bold hair and short skirts as an influence on the death of women are emphasized in the annual health report of the London County Council.

"Dime Fashion," declares the report, "would appear to have taken counsel with the Lady Hyacinth. For in many ways the vagaries of feminine modes struck deeply at the roots of health and sapped the vitality, especially of girls and young women. They dictated the compression of vital organs and the limitation of freedom of movement."

"The result was seen in malformations and diseases very prevalent in the population. The disappearance from the dress of girls of corseting devices such as corsets and garters has had a very great effect in improving both physique and health."

A review of the period from 1850 to 1925 shows the gradual decline in the death rate from 21 to 1600 in 1850 to 12 per 1000 in 1925.

## HEALTH

### NO SPARE PARTS

The human body is the most delicate and beautiful piece of machinery known.

Stop to think of its marvelous development—vision, hearing, taste, smell—properties which inanimate objects cannot possess. And stop to think of the lack of attention and care which this wonderful machine receives from you.

The cheapest and smallest piece of machinery, a plow point, is scraped and cleaned before using; all bridges and large structural works are constantly being painted, oiled and parts replaced, because of the wear and tear of the elements and from the mere fact of its existence.

The engineer oils his locomotive at regular stops advertisements insist on the importance of repair shops and foundries work persistently to replace the worn out pieces which, even with the greatest care, give way under daily strain. And yet the human body is allowed to run, year after year, without supervision or overhauling—a disregard which would not be given the cheapest money-wrench.

You can buy any part of the most expensive automobile or the watch ever used in Kentucky, but there is no store which sells a finger, an eye, a kidney, or indeed, a small unit of human skin for the most basic of human skin for the repair of some simple little scratch.

With the practical control of many infectious diseases (which formerly decimated the populations of certain countries), the use of antitoxins to combat disease in its early stage, the wonderful advantages of selected cases for surgical operations, it would seem that a hearty co-operation on the part of everyone would soon increase the span of life even more.

But scientific research, organizations and talks are of no avail unless you and I express a desire for the positive health which it is possible to have. In the co-operation between the individual and the medical profession, the health examination, or yearly overhauling, is the cornerstone, because it will, in most instances, detect impending disaster, which may be prevented or permanently cured.

School children have an enforced investigation as their eyes, teeth and throats. They are vaccinated and other precautions are taken for life and health. Yet on reaching maturity, these graceless children take liberties with their bodies, apparently heeding in the false opinion that the human frame cannot wear out, periodic health examination by the family physician will prevent much illness and add many years to life.

**BREAKFAST**—Baked pears, broiled salt fish, creamed potatoes, cornmeal and wheat muffins, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Open cream cheese sandwich, jelly roll, maple fluff.

**DINNER**—Roast leg of lamb, mint jelly, potato marbles in parsley butter, creamed carrots, cucumber salad, whole wheat bread, peach mousse, plain cake, milk, coffee.

**Maple Fluff (Individual)**  
One egg, 2-3 cup milk, 3 tablespoons maple syrup.

Beat yolk of egg well with two tablespoons syrup, gradually beating in milk. Beat whites of egg until stiff, beating in one tablespoon syrup. Combine mixtures, beating well. Pour into a tall glass and serve at once.

This amount of syrup makes a very sweet drink, so use less as preferred. The milk should be well chilled to preclude the use of ice. —(Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)
