BANK BOMBER UNIDENTIFIED

PITTSBURG, Aug. 25. (AP)—The fanatic who brought death to himself and a policeman and injury to a score of persons when he exploded a bomb in the Farmers' Deposit Savings bank, during the secret of his identity into the grave so far as police could learn today.

One identification regarded as almost certain—that the man was a maniac escaped from a local hospital for the insane—was discarded when relatives declared the bomber was not of their family. They viewed the badly mangled body at the city morgue, where hundreds have visited in a vain attempt to identify the man.

A belt buckle on which was engraved the letter "L" was the only one out of evidence police had upon which to work.

Apparently Foreigner.
The bomber, a man of foreign appearance, dressed in working clothes, entered the bank yesterday and presented a demand for \$2,000 or till blow up the bank. When George C. Ortman, a special bank policeman, approached to arrest him, he placed a black satchel upon the floor and gave it a kick. A violent explosion followed. The bomber was instantly killed and Ortman so badly injured he died soon after he was taken to a hospital.

Six of the other 24 persons hurt severely enough to require hospital treatment were reported in a serious condition.

Damage \$150,000
Bank officials fixed the damage to the 24-story building at upwards of \$150,000.

While searching the clothing taken from the Ortman's body the lieutenant of detectives, Peter Connors, found the note in which the bomber made his demand and threat. Written on plain writing paper in pencil in good handwriting, the note said:

"Sir: You are held for \$2,000 with 50 sticks of dynamite. The dynamite is in the grip. The one I hold in my hand. It will discharge when the handle is out of my hand. If you or any one else fires the gun at me there will be no cage left, we will all be blowing up to pieces. If you are willing to come through with two thousand and quiet and keep off from the alarm. The help won't do you any good. If they come they come for their death; if not, make all the noise you like. I will help you with the noise that whole Pittsburgh will hear. If you want to see the death machine ask for otherwise absolute silence. Death or \$2,000—either you like."

The note was unsigned.

Sets Off Dynamite
The note, handed to a teller by the bomber, was turned over to Ortman, a special bank policeman. Ortman, after reading it, placed the missive in his pocket and stepped toward the man. As he did so, the bomber kicked the grip and the blast occurred.

Lutheran Churches in Eugene Consolidate

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 25. (AP)—Members of the Trinity Lutheran church and the Eugene Lutheran church, following inter-congregational discussion for the past few weeks, was perfected at a meeting held here last night. A committee was named to draft a constitution for the combined church, and a temporary board of trustees was elected.

According to the terms of the proposal for consolidation, which came from the Trinity congregation and was accepted by the Eugene congregation, all of the regular work, including the morning and evening services, will be conducted in the English language.

A call was issued by the consolidated group, to be known as the Central Lutheran church, to members H. A. H. Nelson, of Grandview, N. D., who is not known whether the call will be accepted.

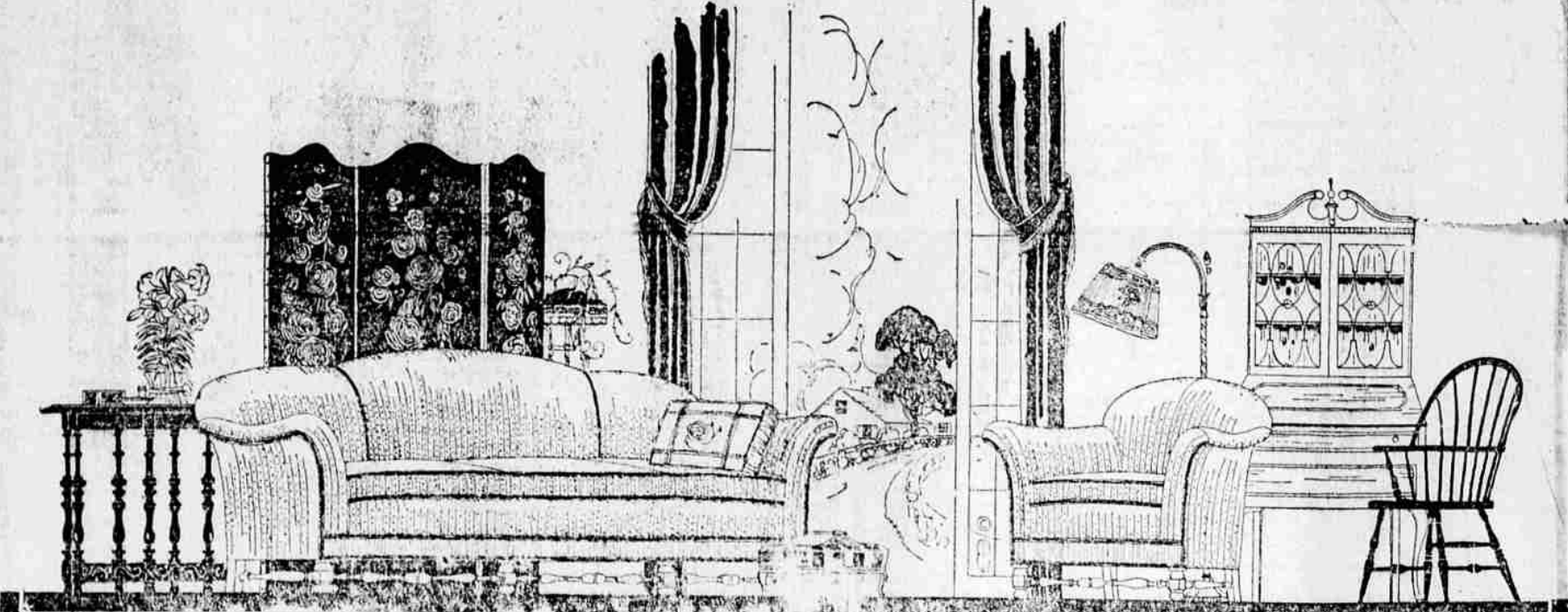
Kiwanians Elect New Officials in Eugene
