## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast — Stewed prunes, cereal, thin cream, crisp fry toast, sour cream waffles, syrup, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Spinach, humbugs, graham bread, peach custard souffle, milk, tea.

Dinner — Cold sliced lamb with vegetable salad, baked macaroni and tomatoes, Boston brown bread, sandwiches, red raspberries with sugar and cream, mocha angel food cake, milk, coffee.

The salad is served in cups of lettuce on the platter with the meat. This makes a most attractive dish and saves dishwashing. Since separate salad plates are not needed. The macaroni is served in the dish in which it was cooked. Another saving in dishwashing.

Two cups thinly sliced peaches, 1/2 cup sugar over peaches, 2 tablespoons flour, 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons butter, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup scalded milk, 1/2 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Arrange peaches in a buttered baking dish and sprinkle with sugar. Melt butter without bubbling and stir in flour. Blend thoroughly and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and stir in sugar and yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Remove at once from the fire and let stand until cool. Fold in the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Pour over peaches and bake in a moderate oven for thirty minutes. Serve at once with cream whipped until firm and sweetened with powdered sugar and flavored slightly with vanilla.

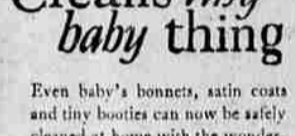
