TEX RICKARD DEFENDS JACK

NEW YORK, Aug. 26. (AP)—Jack Dempsey has never dodged Harry Wills and would rather have fought the negro challenger than Gene Tunney. If the bout could have been arranged, Tex Rickard today told The Associated Press.

"To say that Dempsey fears Wills is a joke," said the promoter. "He considers him a clean-living, estimable citizen but a second-rate fighter."

At the same time, the promoter in a detailed statement defending the champion's course, revealed that his own efforts to stage a

Dempsey-Wills match were blocked two years ago after he had gone so far as to have the tickets for the fight printed.

Opposition on the part of the state athletic commission then was the barrier to the match, although previously the boxing authorities had approved it. New Jersey put up a similar ban and Rickard gave up all thought of trying to hold the contest.

"My experience with the Jeffries-Johnson bout long ago convinced me that a Dempsey-Wills match would not be a good thing for boxing," said Rickard. "As I became better acquainted with the man and talked with persons of influence I saw no reason to change my opinion."

Dempsey, however, Rickard disclosed, had repeatedly urged him to obtain Wills instead of Tunney for a title match. The promoter exhibited a series of telegrams to prove this assertion.

Billy Evans Says:

TWO BIG FINDS

Not many ball players of Italian birth have numbered among the major league stars.

The season of 1925 promises to be a decided exception, for two of the biggest finds of the year are Tony Lazzeri of the Yankees and Oscar Melillo of the St. Louis Browns.

Lazzeri rivals Ruth as the most popular ball player in New York, while no member of the St. Louis Browns is in stronger with the fans of that city than Melillo.

In the right field stands at St. Louis there are several hundred Italian fans every day who pay homage to the deeds of Melillo. He is a big favorite with them, for he has performed sensationally in the field and lived up to expectations at the bat.

Recently he received a letter from one of the more prominent Italian fans at the right field boys had a present for him but there was nothing doing on the presentation staff at the home plate. If he wanted the gift he would have to walk out to the right field stands. I get it.

AN ODD CEREMONY

I happened to be officiating in St. Louis on the day of the presentation. Shortly before the game began the speaker of the occasion yelled Melillo's name, at the same time waved a small traveling bag in the air to acquaint Oscar with the nature of the gift.

In company with a number of the St. Louis players Melillo marched out to right field and there took place one of the most unusual ceremonies ever staged in the major leagues.

It was apparent the fan making the presentation spoke only a few words and then dropped the bag to Melillo, a distance of about 20 feet. Oscar caught it as gracefully as if it was a difficult line drive. After the boys had opened it up, looked it over and Melillo had made a short speech to reply, they returned to the bench. Melillo all smiles.

"What did the spokesman say to you?" I asked Melillo.

"Here it is 'Dug', and don't

make a fool of catching it," was the length of the speech, explained Lazzeri.

"What did you say in reply?" "Boys, I sure wish it was filled with base hits, including a few doubles and triples. Thanks."

STILL UP INTEREST

Unquestionably Lazzeri and Melillo have stirred up a keen interest among the Italian fans, who have always been strong for the game.

These two players, certain to be stars, will give the sons of Italy a chance to do some arguing when a discussion arises as to whether the Irish, Dutch or Italians make the best ball players.

I understand that in all the Italian barber shops in New York the name of Lazzeri has supplanted that of Ruth and a picture of Tony graces the walls of every real up-to-date place.

Both Lazzeri and Melillo are second-sackers and have greatly helped their respective clubs. In fact, no player on the New York
