BOMBER'S NAME
YET UNKNOWN BY
INVESTIGATORS

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 26 (AP)—Spurred on by posting of a \$1000 reward, police investigating the bombing of the Farmers' Trust Savings bank today redoubled their efforts to identify the bomber whose body lies in the city morgue.

The reward was offered by the Pittsburgh Gazette-Times for information leading to identification of the man, who on Tuesday set off the bomb which brought death to himself and to a special policeman. More than a score of others were injured, while a portion of the banking room was wrecked.

Clue Found.

This clue in the form of a telephone number written upon a scrap of paper, was found in the dead man's pocket. The number was that of a contractor, who told police the only man he knew of that might have his phone number was Frank N. Andreoli, a stone mason. Andreoli, it was definitely learned, is alive, although he was not home when police went there to question him. Authorities were seeking him to-day in an effort to discover whether he might have known the bomber.

Seven in Hospital.

Meanwhile, most of the 24 persons injured by the blast had returned to their homes. Seven still remained in hospitals, four of them in a critical condition. Mrs. George Ortmann, wife of the policeman killed in the blast, was reported seriously ill from shock.

PRUNE DAMAGE
SEEMS GREAT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26 (AP)—"It looks very serious for the prune crop," said M. J. Newhouse, manager of the North Pacific Cooperative Prune exchange this morning. "While we have as yet heard from only a few of our districts damage reports are already coming in and if the rain storm that visited Portland last night was general through the valley the results will be disastrous."

"If it rains off promptly the loss, while heavy, will not be enormous but if the rains should continue for a few days the loss will be terrific as the prunes would lay on the ground and rot."

"Picking only started this week and it will take at least 20 days to harvest the crop and get it to the dryers so you see practically the entire crop is at the mercy of last night's storm."

"The crop came on all at once this year due to the long drought and naturally any delay now in getting the prunes to the dryers would be a dead loss, not so much from splitting as from rotting on the ground."

Local drying lines generally steady and unchanged. Bids for butter and eggs remain the same as Wednesday. Calf continued good for heavy hams and light broilers at 25 to 26 cents on the former and 20 to 21 cents on the latter.

Other lines of poultry quiet. Good calf for country dressed hogs and calves at 18 to 19 cents.

Fresh prunes are slightly stronger in the eastern markets. Oregon stocks meeting a better demand at the daily auctions. Shipments from the Pacific northwest are past the peak, with the bulk of the fresh already marketed.

Oregon Italian prunes in bulk sold at 90c to \$1 on the Boston market, averaging 95 cents. The Boston market is firm.

Northwest primary markets are steady, with demand moderate. Prices generally unchanged at 55 to 49 cents on suit cases.

Wheat Drops Following
Opening Rallies Today

CHICAGO, Aug. 26 (AP)—Scattered buying proved sufficient today to give an early upward trend to wheat values. Shipments of wheat out of Chicago are large, and but few traders appeared willing to press the selling side of the market. Starting unchanged to 1/4c higher, wheat quickly scored moderate general gains. Corn and oats relatively were easy, corn opening unchanged to 1/4c off but later showing something of a rally. Provisions held about steady.

Wheat closed unsettled 1/2 to 1 1/2c net lower; corn 1/4 to 1 1/2c off; oats 1/2 to 3/4c down and provisions varying from 7c decline to a rise of 17 cents.
