Although in seclusion today in her Amsterdam avenue home, with a police guard outside to prevent the crowds which still gathered from disturbing her after the exertions of her welcome home yesterday, Trude sent out a message to newspapermen when a police sergeant carried in a message from them telling of Mrs. Corson's victory.

"I came back to La Grande in a short time and have lived here ever since." Judge Knowles was practicing law in Wichita, Kan., when he was only 21 years of age. But even before that he was active in Kansas professional circles.

ONE TIME REPORTER

"I used to be a reporter on the Walnut Valley Times at the same time that William Allen White was newshunting for the Republican in the same field," the judge smiled, recalling those days of personal journalism. "He frequently referred to me in his articles as the red-headed reporter of the 'Times,' and I retorted by calling him 'the red-headed, freckle-faced reporter for the Republican.'"

Judge Knowles also enjoys the acquaintance of Henry J. Allen, editor and owner of the Wichita Beacon, and famed as the joint hero of "Bill" White's "Martial Adventures of Henry and Me." Allen and Judge Knowles were fellow students at Baker university.

(Continued from Page 1) contemplated making a 3,000-mile flight. He had circled the landing field once and was descending to make a landing when the airplane dropped nose first, about 100 feet from shore.

Officers, sailors and marines rushed to the rescue. Schultz had loosened the straps that held him to his seat and was working to release Rodgers when help came. The heads of the two flyers were just above water.

"Easy boy," Rodgers said as his rescuers tried to lift him out of the wreckage. "I'm caught somewhere." The engine of the plane lay partly on the commander's chest and one leg was caught in the wreckage. The plane had to be taken apart to extricate him. He died two hours later.

On the operating table surgeons found that the heavy engine had crushed his chest, broken ribs, and punctured his vital organs. The commander was conscious almost to the end.

Realizing that he was fatally injured, Rodgers asked that his mother, who lives at Havre De Grace, Maryland, be notified. She left for Philadelphia, but arrived too late to see her son alive.

that Pendleton was preparing for at least a book in the parade and that not only the Pendleton post but the citizens are entering into the spirit of the convention and will help as much as possible.

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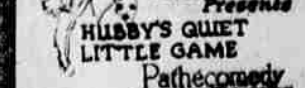
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
