### Farm Pointers

The Columbia basin district in Oregon has many successful commercial bee colonies, reports the college extension service. Climatic conditions are generally good, seasons long, plants abundant, including alfalfa, sweet clover, fireweed and dandelion.  
Change in the size of dairy herds is having an effect on the trend of the experiment station. With improved machinery, the coast district herds are increasing in size to the maximum carrying capacity of the farm. Size of the dairy farm is also increasing in the Willamette valley area, while the sideline dairy operated in connection with small fruit or truck farming tends to decrease slightly.

In perennial cankers working on older bark in Oregon orchards the color is reddish-brown or purplish with rings of lighter color showing at the time when the tiny pimples or the fungus appear on the surface, says the experiment station. These elevations which appear in somewhat definite lines around the trunk of the tree, are the canker, break the skin of the bark. As the diseased tissues become sunken, fissures are formed bounding the canker.

The average steer in the Blus mountains district of Oregon weighs about 1000 pounds at 20 months of age, says a report by the experiment station on the cost of beef production. These that have received good care usually weigh 1050 pounds at that age without any increase in the feed and expense bill. The cost of production given in the station tables is based on good management—management a little better than the average but not quite Heil.

One cutworm control recommended by the experiment station is made by dissolving one pound sodium fluoride in two gallons of water into which is stirred two quarts of molasses and 16 pounds of bran. This combination is thoroughly mixed and is good for control of other cutworm or earwig. The poison bait can often be purchased already mixed with the exception of water.

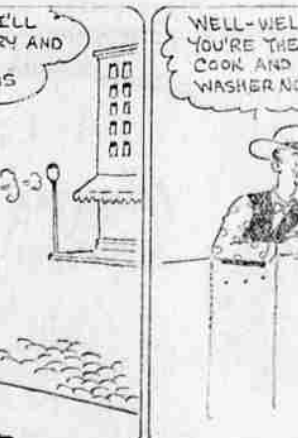
