N.G. FOOTBALL LEAGUE IS PLAN

The Eastern Oregon companies of the Oregon National Guard will have a football league this season, Captain W. B. Goodnight, of the Baker company, and Captain J. E. Allen, of Pendleton, accompanied by several members of the two units, were in the city yesterday conferring with Captain G. L. Dutton, of Company E, of La Grande, on the subject.

Three or Four Cities. The league will be composed of the La Grande, Baker, Pendleton and probably The Dalles companies. The teams will be made up entirely of men belonging to the guard companies and will play six games each, starting about October 1.

Each team will have its own coach. Captain G. L. Dutton will coach the La Grande squad and South Glendman of the high school and also a member of the Baker company, will coach the Baker team. Pendleton has not announced who their coach will be, and no word has been received from The Dalles. The teams will be organized immediately and the practice work started.
