## Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Chilled cantaloupe, cereal, thin cream, blueberry muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Plain soufflé with creamed shrimps, curly endive with French dressing, stuffed baked apples, graham bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Pheasant of lamb, boiled potatoes in parsley butter, late peas in butter, blackberry Charlotte, bran bread, milk, coffee.

You will find this plain soufflé with its accompanying sauce very much worth while during the hot weather of August and September.

The sauce can be varied as convenient, any well seasoned creamed fish, vegetable or meat can be used.

## Soufflé

Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 cup milk, 2 eggs, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon paprika.

Melt butter, stir in flour and when perfectly blended slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Add salt and pepper and cook until thick and smooth. Remove from the fire and beat in yolks of eggs until stiff and dry on a platter, using a wire whisk. Fold into first mixture and turn into a well buttered baking dish. Place in a pan of hot water and bake twenty-five minutes in a moderate oven. Serve as soon as done or the soufflé will fall.

Do not attempt to remove the soufflé from the baking dish to serve with the sauce poured over it. Serve from baking dish and put sauce in a separate dish.

## Lane County Trusty Is Fugitive from Prison

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 1. (AP)—H. L. Wood, trusty at the state penitentiary who was sent up from Lane county in October 1925, to serve three years for burglary escaped last night about 8 o'clock. He was employed at guards quarters, which is outside the prison walls. Wood is reported to have been seen on the Silverton road and he is believed headed in that direction. He is 26 years old.
