Mrs. John Hodgson and Mrs. Homer Wilson will select the best single specimen on points of form, foliage and coloring. There will also be various honors in other varieties, one for the best single specimen and one for the best collection of mixed kinds.

Flower Divisions

Following the list of flower divisions and the plans for the judging:

Asters—Judged by Mrs. George T. Cochran and Mrs. Alfred Miller. Single aster, single specimen; first, second and third collections; Comet, ostrich feather, queen of market and asterum, single specimens. Judged on form, size, color, foliage and arrangement.

Dubious—By Mrs. Miller and G. H. Quigley. Cactus, decorative, peony flowered, pom-pom, collar-cite and single, single specimens, first, second and third collections.

Gladioli—By Mrs. J. T. Scroggie and Mrs. Earl Stoddard. Single specimens of ruffled and plain varieties. Judged on blending of color and perfection of spike; collections judged on blending of color, perfection of flowers and arrangement.

Zinnias—By Mrs. Ray F. Murphy and Mrs. C. E. Happerzett. Single specimen, on size and perfection; first, second and third collections, on blending of colors, perfection of flowers, size and arrangement.

Sweetpeas—By Mrs. C. E. Pennington and Mrs. Murphy. First, second and third collections, on length of stem and arrangement.

Scabiosa—By Mrs. A. W. Nelson and Mrs. William Miller. First, second and third collections, on length of stem and arrangement.

Marigolds—By Mr. Albert Hunter and Mrs. E. C. Horingert. First, second and third arrangements in baskets; first, second and third arrangements in bowls, on artistic arrangement, number of different flowers, blending of color, perfection of flowers.

Pansies—By Mrs. George Cochran and Mrs. Scroggie. First, second and third collections, on size and arrangement.

Marigolds—By Harry Zurbick and Mrs. Earl Stoddard. Single specimens, on size and perfection of flowers; first, second and third collections, on size, perfection of flowers and arrangement.

Calendula—Single specimen, on size and perfection of flower; first, second and third collection, on size, perfection of flower and arrangement; French, single specimen, on size and perfection; first, second and third collections, on size, perfect of flower and arrangement.

Unusual flowers—By Mr. Zurbick and Mrs. Stoddard. Single specimens, on novelty, first, second and third collection, on novelty and arrangement.

GUARDSMEN TO HALT RIOTING

trouble started with the arrival of strike breakers Sunday.

Attempted to Fire Bomb—After a night and day of disorders, during which an attempt was made to fire the mill, the trouble reached a peak last night when strikers gathered at the head of the Blackstone river bridge, leading to the plant. One man starting to cross the bridge, was pushed back by police. The crowd wavered a moment then rushed. The police met the advance with swinging night sticks, but were forced to retreat before superior numbers and to resort to gas bombs.

The bomb again checked the mob's advance, but another series of rushes finally brought volleys from riot guns and service revolvers. Five strikers and sympathizers went down wounded with buckshot while Aram Auckliff, 15, of Woonsocket, a nephew of Mayor Soudy, was struck in the face by a revolver bullet over the heads of the crowd. He was in a crowd of spectators on a hill overlooking the battle.

Sheriff Is Shot

Deputy Sheriff Percy Butterfield of Providence was struck on the nose by a charge of buckshot. Lieutenant John Baird of the state police was struck in the foot and one state police was cut about the face and head by stones.

Charges of strike leaders that the state police influenced the crowd to riot were denied by Colonel Clarke. He said that his men retreated from the bridge only because he wanted to use riot guns at a range that would not result in fatalities. His men fired because clubs proved useless, he said.

Carl Alexander Johnson, anti-Tammany candidate endorsed for the democratic gubernatorial nomination by William Gibbs McAdoo, was running almost neck and neck with his anti-McAdoo opponent, Justice R. Wardell of San Francisco. The vote: Johnson 18,578; Wardell 18,591.

Returns from 4452 precincts showed United States Senator Samuel M. Shortridge, Coolidge republican, booming ahead into a sweeping victory over Robert M. Clarke, his anti-world court rival, for the republican senatorial nomination. Shortridge's lead over Clarke in these 11 a. m. figures was 44,420, more than three times the lead he had at 2 a. m.

Senatorial Results

The voter Shortridge 186,502; Clarke 125,652; Walter F. Lachner (anti-world court and anti-saloon league candidate) 57,425.

Shortridge, whose leading opponent had the vigorous support of Senator Hiram Johnson, apparently was head-off for a much greater chance than the anti-green line.
