

U. O. OPENING SHOWS GROWTH

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Sept. 1. (Special).—On September 27 the University of Oregon will open its doors for the regular session, marking a half-century of service to the state.

In 1876 a mere handful of students registered for the first time, which in 1926 nearly 2500 are expected to be on hand on the campus for work.

Register September 29

Registration week begins September 29, on which day entering freshmen take a physical examination and on the following day an English examination. Registration material will be released on Wednesday, and the last three days of the week will be taken up by registration of both old and new students. Late registration fines begin September 27, when classes start. The week before classes start is also devoted to rushing.

The fall term lasts until December 11, when Christmas vacation starts. On January 3 the winter term begins. After spring vacation, the spring term opens March 23, lasting until June 13, which date officially closes the year with commencement exercises for the class of 1927.

50 Years of Service

The big event of the year will be the Semi-Centennial celebration of the University's half-century of service, October 18-24, terminating in Homecoming. At this time Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall will be dedicated into the presidency, and educational conferences, attended by outstanding scholars and educators from all parts of the country, will be held.

Dr. Hall whose arrival on the campus has been delayed by political science conferences in the east, will meet with the new freshman, September 29, and make an address of welcome. It was announced today. He will appear before the student body at the first assembly which comes during the first week of the term.

HEALTH

ASTHMA (By Aaron Brown, M. D., New York City) Member Gorgas Memorial Institute

Asthma is a disease that has been known for hundreds of years; but it is only recently that a means of relieving or curing many of the sufferers has been found.

With asthma the attacks are characterized by difficulty in breathing. At first the attacks are few and far between. Later they become more or less continuous.

The victims of asthma, it is found, have a weakness toward certain substances, when breathed in, or taken as food, drink or medicine. Among the substances breathed in, which may cause asthma are: dander from all animals, cats, dogs,

rabbits, horses; also birds or furs; house dusts, flour, mustard, pepper, face powder. Various pollens of flowers, grasses, weeds, trees, may cause asthmatic attacks associated with hay fever.

Substances taken by mouth (especially important in children) include the entire dietary list and particularly, milk, eggs, nuts, and cereals. Medicines, such as aspirin, quinine, or ipecac may also produce an attack.

If the asthmatic patient will follow his physician's directions and the following suggestions in day to day living, he will continue to enjoy life as do normal individuals:

Keep away from dust; no broom sweeping in the house. Use vacuum cleaner.

Keep all animals away from the home.

Sleep in well ventilated room, not too cold, and use free from furniture as possible.

Use no rugs or curtains in bedroom, nor put camphor or turpentine in room.

Do not overeat. Take the heaviest meal at noon. It is better to eat small amounts often, even five or six times a day. Eat sparingly of starches and sugar and omit the drinking of carbonated waters.

See that the bowels move daily. Take things easy. Do not rush to work. Try not to worry or get excited.

Protect yourself against wind, wet and colds.

Should you catch cold, stay home and avoid complications.

Take only medicine specified by your doctor.
