It begins to look like there will be quite a few new individual leaders for the 1926 major league season. More so, perhaps, than in several campaigns.

In the National a new batting champion is likely. For with the end of the chase but five weeks away, there doesn't seem much possibility of Rogers Hornsby overhauling the pace-setters.

Hornsby, six times king of the old circuit clubbers is some distance in the rear of "Doc" Traynor of the Pirates and Babe Herman of the Dodgers, not to mention Flete Brosler, who has been out of quite a few games but who will no doubt take part in more than 100 trays, the number usually necessary before a player is figured a regular.

## RATHER WIN PENNANT

Hornsby, who for some time has had aspirations to excel Ty Cobb's major league mark of nine straight batting titles, says the batting crown isn't worrying him these days. What he wants is a pennant winner, something a St. Louis club has never yet had.

Hornsby, as you know, has been far below his normal hitting gall all season. He got away poorly, was out of the lineup several times through illness and injuries, and has been trailing the leaders all summer.

Should Rogers fail to annex the crown this year, it will halt the most sensational string of successes a batter has ever known in the National League, and the second best in modern baseball play.

SALEM, Sept. 2.—Declaring that Anti-Salem league domination of Oregon politics, openly professed by the league in a published announcement that no candidate for public office can be elected without its endorsement is an "undesirable interference in state affairs" and is inspired by "fanatic" sponsors for the independent candidacy of H. 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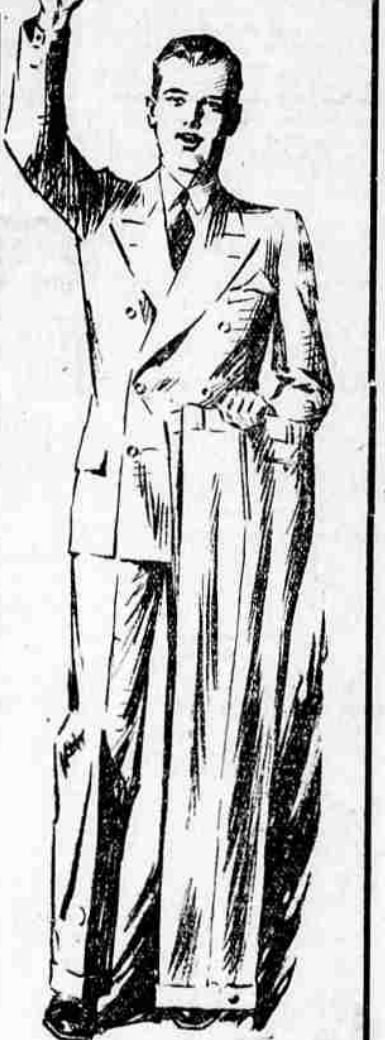
