LABOR IN FAVOR OF A HANDS-OFF POLICY IN STATE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 2. (AP)—Adoption of a "hands-off" policy on all matters, not strictly pertaining to labor marked activities of the 24th annual convention of the Oregon State Federation of Labor in session here.

As a result the session took no action on House Bill 412, regulating commercial vehicles. C. E. Stead, said to represent the truck men of the state, was formally recognized as a labor representative on the floor of the convention and the reputation made part of the record.

Because of adoption of the policy adopted this morning delegates were of the opinion that no expression of sentiment regarding state or inheritance taxes would be made public.

The convention went on record as favoring adoption of a constitutional amendment to give the state the right to be given a monopoly and all private companies to be eliminated.
