Milady's Toiletry Still Costs Million and a Half

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The department of commerce announces that, according to the data collected at the recent biennial census of manufactures, perfumery, cosmetics and toilet preparations to the aggregate value of \$141,488,000 were made in the United States during 1925, this being an increase of nearly 19 per cent as compared with \$119,237,000 in 1924, the last preceding census year. The total for 1925 was made up as follows:
