awarding the summer school scholarship. The first will be proficiency of care as shown in the stock and their development when displayed at the Union stock show grounds. The second, proficiency of showmanship, will also be judged on the show grounds at Union. The third consideration will be the neatness and fullness of

records which will be collected annually at stock show time. The fourth basis for the award will be an essay, "The Importance of the Scientific Breeding of Livestock—Eugenics Idea." Dr. Phy is president of the state board of health and his interest in problems of heredity is leading him to place to per cent of the decision on the thought and study shown in these themes. The other three bases will each have 10 per cent value.

Three Trustees Named.

Three trustees have been named for the fund. Two are La Grande men. The chairman will always be the Union county agent. He is now H. G. Avery. Mr. Avery was agent during Marvin's life and was intimately connected with him. The secretary of the fund will be the secretary of the Union county chamber of commerce, now held by Earl C. Reynolds. The directorship of the Eastern Oregon experiment station always will carry with it a place on the board of trustees.
