"The Sea Beast" opened yesterday at the Sherry theater for a run of three days and justified in every way all the glowing heaped of golden adjectives that have been piled up about this supreme effort of Warner Brothers.

John Barrymore is the star, but even with Barrymore the drama of "The Sea Beast" is the thing. The sea dominates and, even Barrymore, superb actor that he is, is less, as any human would be less, than the epic that flashes tumultuously across the screen; the epic of the American sailors of 1840. VALUE OF GRAIN IS DETERMINED

The State Grain Inspection Department is open today for the benefit of all persons in the state who are interested in growing or dealing in grain. All grain shipped to Portland or Astoria is weighed, inspected and graded as to Federal grades at these terminals by the State Grain Inspection Department. All dealings in grain at these points are on the basis of these standards.

When grain is bought or sold in the interior the price paid is directly or indirectly based on these grades. The grades are based on the quality of the grain, mixtures, dockage, smut, etc. Anyone getting inspection and grades on his grain while it is in the warehouse or on the farm is in a better position to market his grain at more nearly its true value.

In order to make this information available to all parties interested, the State Grain Inspection Department will inspect samples that are mailed in and will furnish certificates showing the grades, weight per bushel, dockage, smut, etc. Great care should be taken in sample, as the inspection is of value only in proportion to the correctness of the sample.

CHICAGO, Sept. 4. (AP)—National officers of W. C. T. U. "are personally of the opinion that the state department is well able to handle its own affairs" and "do not think the national convention of the W. C. T. U. will have anything to do" with the case of the reported champagne party given Gertrude Ederle, New York girl swimmer of the English channel by William Corcoran, United States consul at Bolzano, France.

STATE TO HEAR MONTANA SOLON

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 6.—Thomas J. Walsh, United States senator from Montana, will be the principal speaker at the Oregon State Bar association convention here October 2.

This announcement was made by Richard W. Montague, president of the association, at a meeting of the executive committee, after the committee had voted to hold the session here October 1 and 2, instead of at Bend, as was first contemplated.

Senator Walsh is a leader of the democrats in the senate. He gained considerable fame as prosecutor in the Teapot Dome investigation, and also as chairman of the 1924 democratic convention. He declined the nomination of the democratic party for vice president at this convention in order to remain in the senate.

Several important business matters will come before the association. Important among them will be the adoption of a new constitution designed on the "federal plan" which has been in use for several years in Washington and Minnesota.

The plan provides that local bar associations shall be the unit instead of individual members. A special committee, headed by Oscar Haxter of Dallas, is advocating the change. A proposal to advocate restoration of the rule-making power of judges for procedure in their courts will also be considered. The state judicial council probably will meet simultaneously with the bar association.

Descendant of Canadian Rail Pioneers on Trial

CANTERBURY, Eng., Sept. 6. (AP)—Charged with the murder of John Thomas Derham of a wealthy British family, Alphonso E. A. Smith, grandson of Sir Frederick Smith and Hugh Hyan, noted in Canadian railroad history, has been committed for trial at the next Assizes.

"I have nothing to say except that I am not guilty," declared Smith after the inquiry into the shooting of Derham in Smith's villa in the presence of Smith's wife August 12.

This triangle case has created a stir. Derham was lured to the scene of his death by a telegram sent him in the name of "Mrs. Smith by her husband."

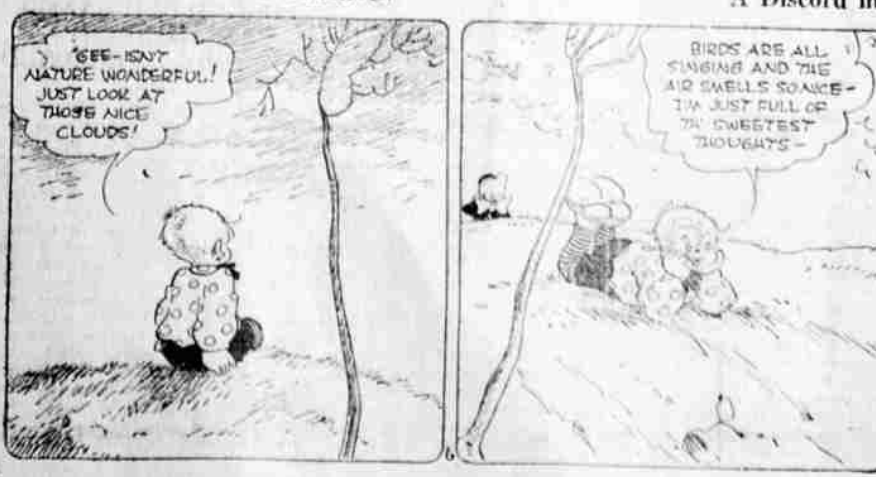
