MUTINIES REPORTED

LONDON, Sept. 6. (AP)—A state of war exists throughout Spain, a special decree issued by the Spanish government announced this action was made necessary through mutinies in the artillery section of the army at Segovia and Valladolid in protest against the substitution of electoral promotion of officers for the ancient custom of advancement by seniority.

The Spanish government in an official statement declares a "mutiny movement has been completely suppressed and that reports from all parts of Spain are that perfect order prevails."

"Owing to the excellent discipline of the military forces and the prestige of the authorities," there has been no bloodshed or violence, the statement adds.

Reports from France, however, say there has been rioting in Barcelona and Valencia while advances from Gibraltar declare that the warships at Barcelona and Cadix are making common cause with the artillerymen.

None of these rumors can be confirmed, and there is much curiosity here as to whether the Spanish official announcements tell the whole story and whether the country is as orderly as the censored dispatches profess.

WASHINGTON — Next November's election is only a Congressional election but some presidential candidates are at stake in it, for all that.

President Coolidge's is one. If the Democrats and insurgent Republicans get Congress, or even the Senate, away from him, his chances of a renomination will be slighted. His party primaries left him politically croaky. A defeat in the fall would be almost sure to knock him out—in 1928.

On the other hand, let the voters rebuke the Republican insurgents and re-elect all the regulars, and he'll come up strong for the ensuing round.

by a baroque, an Indian custom. White people will play a very small part in the removal of the chief. A monument in his memory is being erected and will be unveiled on that day by the granddaughter of Wallawa county's oldest citizen.

School children all over Eastern Oregon will study the life of Joseph and the Indian tribe, from the beginning of school until the date of the burial. As many as possible are urged to attend the ceremonies so that they might better understand the history of this famous tribe of Indians and the power and greatness of their leaders.

Very little is known of the first Chief Joseph except that he was the father of the famous Joseph, but he, too, was a shrewd and powerful leader and an orator of rare ability.

Was An Old Plan. For many months the movement has been on foot to remove the old chief's remains to the resting place of his tribesmen, and although much of the homage being and to be paid in memory of him in a preliminary step to the removal of the young chief Joseph's remains to Wallawa county, his own greatness must not be forgotten.

The young chief, who died September 22, 1904, is now buried at Nespelem, Washington. The Oregon Trail association and citizens of Wallawa county are working now on having his body removed from that place to the resting place of his father and tribesmen, but before the removal can be made it must first be sanctioned by the Indian bureau at Washington, D. C.
