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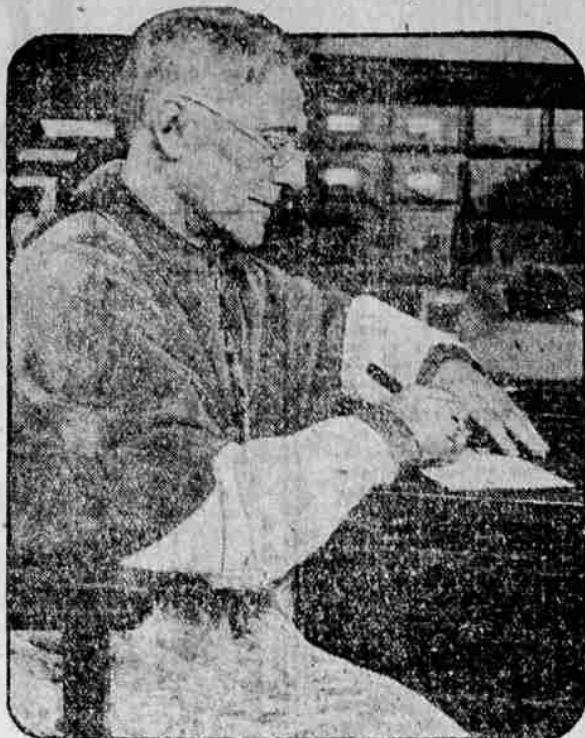
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Named New Archbishop in Texas



Rev. Arthur J. Drouin, for eight years bishop of San Antonio, Tex., has been appointed archbishop of the newly created Roman Catholic archdiocese of San Antonio, formerly a part of the New Orleans province. The new archdiocese contains approximately 1,000,000 Catholics, with church property valued at \$20,000,000.

Nearly 250,000 Autos Stolen In 1925--Carelessness Blamed

Nearly 250,000 motor vehicles of an approximate aggregate value of \$2,800,000 were stolen in the United States during the year 1925, as revealed by an investigation made by the research division of the American Automobile association. Assuming that 50 per cent of these were recovered, the total loss to motorists was \$700,000,000 for the vehicles alone.

Each vehicle received as well as those never received cost some insurance premiums, because the cost of recovery and of putting the vehicles back into their original condition tends to maintain the cost of theft insurance. Moreover, the owners lose the use of their stolen cars for varying periods and usually lose a day or more in going to court.

Several ways of frustrating the automobile thief are in use or available. One is state registration of motor vehicles and the required proof of ownership in some states before licenses are issued, but the requirements are by no means uniform and often are insufficient.

Another method is the stamping of serial numbers into the engine and frame. These measures aid in recovery, but do not prevent theft, although they may be deterrents. Locks on the cars provide the owners with the best preventive of actual theft. These are discussed at length by Charles M. Minby and C. B. Veal, of New York City, in the August issue of the "Journal of the Society of Automotive Engineers."

Locked Car Immune All Statistics on the subject clearly point to the fact, they state, that any locked car, if the lock has merit, is immune from theft.

Second Solid Trainload Of Maytags Is Received

When the local Maytag shop announced a month ago that its company had purchased a solid trainload of washing machines, it was regarded as a record accomplishment, but no one dreamed that they would go so far as to sell all those machines and order another solid trainload in thirty days. But that is exactly what they have done.

The first trainload was received with great celebration Aug. 1. The order for the second trainload was placed shortly after the middle of August and has already arrived.

This is said to be the greatest number of washing machines sold by one distributor in one month's time anywhere in the world. In fact it is claimed that it is almost double what any distributor has ever done before.

To celebrate the great accomplishment of two trainloads in thirty days, the Maytag Pacific Company held an all-day celebration at Portland, Oregon September 6th and the entire local organization from this city attended.

Pickers Flocking to Hood Apple Harvest

HOOD RIVER, Sept. 7.—The mid-Columbia apple harvest is slowly getting under way. Winter Banana apples have been harvested, and growers are now delivering their d'Anjou pears to packing plants, where the fruit is pre-cooled and then graded and packed under refrigeration.

The crew of the National plant of the Apple Growers' association number 60. At this place 3000 boxes are being packed daily. By the first of the week a similar number of boxes will be made ready for shipment at the Odell warehouse.

A steady stream of transient labor is arriving in the valley, more to date than can be placed. Scores of arrivals negotiate direct with growers. Mrs. J. W. Ingalls said that up to yesterday she had placed 100 pickers with growers.

These Hens Laid Each 249 Eggs in 11 Months

LONGVIEW, Wash., Sept. 7.—In 11 months' time a flock of 400 White Leghorn hens on the Longview Suburban company's demonstration here has laid an average of 249.8 eggs for each hen, a mark which, according to E. L. Wells, of Prosser, Wash., noted northwest poultryman, probably never has been surpassed by a purely commercial flock. The farm is managed by Walter Meager.

The chickens that made the record were bought as chicks in April, 1925, and the records have been kept since October 1. "Good stock, good feed and good care are responsible for Meager's remarkable record," said Wells. Meager hopes to show a net profit of \$3 per bird over a year's time.

Puget Sound Fox Farm Owners to Show Furs

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 7.—Puget Sound fox farmers will abandon their individual fox shows, which had been planned for Seattle this fall, and will concentrate their efforts on putting up a fine exhibit at the national show to be held in Portland, October 30 to November 2, under the auspices of the American National Fox Breeders' association.

The national association has decided to hold its annual show this year on this coast and will stage it as one department of the Pacific international livestock exposition at Portland.

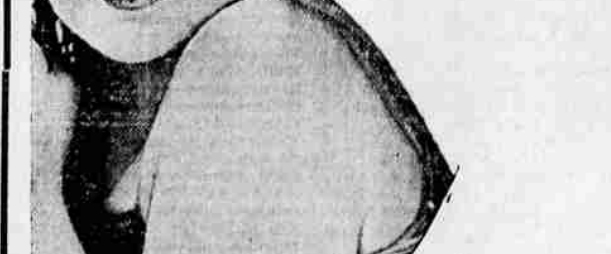
