THE BOOTERY

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Orange juice, cereal cooked with dates, crisp rye toast, peanut butter, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Stuffed eggplant, Boston brown bread, cucumber sticks, chilled apple sauce, ginger cookies, milk tea.

Dinner—Pittsburgh ham, baked potatoes, stuffed tomatoes, new cabbage, salad, chilled stuffed cantaloupe, graham rolls, milk, coffee.

Cucumbers are pared, cut in eighths, chilled in ice water for half an hour. The sticks are then drained and served on a bed of crushed ice, like celery, and with salt.

Stuffed Eggplant—One large eggplant or two small ones, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1 onion, 3 tablespoons minced parsley, 2 medium sized tomatoes, 1 cup coarse stale bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons butter.

Cut eggplants in halves and remove pulp without breaking the skin. Put pulp in a bowl with salt, pepper and vinegar and let stand one hour. Then drain. Melt butter in frying pan and add onion peeled and chopped, parsley, tomatoes pared and coarsely chopped. Fry until a golden brown. Add drained eggplant, bread crumbs soaked in milk and salt and pepper. Fry until mixture is tender. Fill eggplant shells with stuffing, dot with bits of butter and bake in a moderate oven until the top is brown and the shells are tender.

FACTS FOR THE DIABETIC (By C. H. Hotricher, M. D., Seattle)

Pain usually accompanies disease, but with diabetes this is not the usual experience. This peculiarity invariably characterizes the history of most of the million diabetics in the United States.

Diabetes seems to strike in the dark. It is insidious in its progress. Often one does not know of its presence until stricken with the most severe phases. Though diabetes seems to strike in the dark there are symptoms which precede it and are recognizable by the physician making a thorough physical examination. Hence, the yearly health audit is an important means of detecting this disease in its incipency.

When discovered diabetes must be treated with "knowing" and "respect" with the knowledge that it can be lived with, successfully, by obeying orders.

There are two questions, the answers for which every person with diabetes must know all of the time:

"Am I sugar and acetone free?"

"Is my weight being maintained at normal?"

Every person with diabetes should be able to answer questions of urine for the presence of sugar and acetone. Observations should be made at frequent intervals to see if these substances are present. If either sugar or acetone are present, alterations should be made to eliminate them.

Whether any given diet is adequate for any individual is told by the body weight, and not by the sensations sent out from the stomach. Watch the body weight. If your weight is normal for your age and height, it should be maintained so. If you are underweight consult your physician about gaining and if you are overweight consult him about losing. Most diabetics are better when under weight.

Two emergencies may arise which require careful management.

One emergency is that of acute acidosis. This condition is accompanied by stomach uneasiness and distress culminating in vomiting. There is danger to the life of the individual in this state. The person should move bowels by means of an enema, keep warm, go to bed, drink freely of water, black coffee or orange juice and call his physician immediately.

When under treatment with insulin, there may be times when, with a given dosage of insulin accompanied by a given diet, the blood sugar is reduced to too low a level. Under these conditions the individual may become weak, nervous and perspire freely. Relief is readily obtained by eating food, preferably a readily absorbable carbohydrate food such as orange juice, grape juice or sugar. When taking insulin always carry several lumps of sugar in pocket or purse for just such an emergency.

Only with careful co-operation between the physician and patient can diabetes be successfully treated. Follow religiously the treatment that the doctor outlines, and it is possible for you to live on your normal span and be happy and comfortable while doing it.

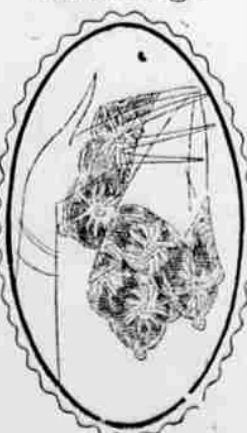
