FATE PLAYS PART
Fate plays unusual pranks in the career of every athlete.

Sometimes it is a pleasing smile, often a most unfriendly frown.

Recently Ted Lyons star pitcher of the Chicago White Sox, worked a no-hit game against Boston.

Such a performance is close to the last word in pitching.

Vary often such games are tainted with plays that might be scored as hits or errors. The performance of Lyons had no such blemish.

Only two men reached first, one on a base on balls, the other on a fumble, followed by a wild throw. Only one ball was hit hard, a line drive by Jacobson to Outfielder Johnny Mostil.

In breaking into the list of no-hit pitchers who have worked no-hit games, Lyons received deserved recognition, for it is doubtful if any pitcher ever had a tougher break, in this respect than was his portion a year ago.

GOAL OF ALL
Next to a no-hit game, in which

players may reach first through fielding or battery errors, is the so-called perfect game, in which not a batsman reaches first.

In order to turn such a trick it is necessary for a pitcher to retire the players in order as they step to the plate for nine consecutive innings.

That is no mean trick against a big hitting, big league ball club. Incidentally, it is not unusual for a pitcher to give a base on balls or a fielder to err.

GIRL RIDER IS AT SANATORIUM

Wilma Moncreif, 10-Year-
Old Equestrienne of
Union Back After Ne-
braska Mishap.

HOT LAKE, Sept. 8. (Special)—Wilma Moncreif, tiny 10-year equestrienne of Union who has been displaying her trick horses at rodeos and fairs throughout the west since she captivated Eastern Oregon at the Union stock show, will do no feature riding for several weeks.

She lies in the hospital department of the Hot Lake Sanatorium with the arm that guided her mounts, the bay Prince and Blanco.
