MIDDLE LIFE—A PERIOD OF DANGER

It is a fact that the average length of human life has increased nearly 15 years in the last 20, but this increase has been obtained by the preventive measures applied to the early years and the saving of life from 5 to 10.

The death rate after 45 years of life in the United States has increased and is steadily mounting. The average death rate of all ages in the United States in 1922 was per 100,000. The death rate above 45 was 156 per 100,000.

An analysis of the causes of death shows that the largest number of deaths after 45 are due to heart and blood vessel diseases, kidney disease and cancer. But the arresting fact is that more than half the deaths in this middle period are preventable and should not occur until many years later.

This sacrifice of life and energy at its most productive period is not only a sociologic factor of tremendous import; it is an economic loss of incalculable value to the nation, because we are thus losing men and women at the period of their lives when, by training and experience, they are prepared to do most for the country. It is unnecessary, sheer waste of life and efficiency.

What may be done to prevent the unnecessary deaths from the heart and blood vessel diseases? These diseases begin insidiously and usually very gradually. They are the product of various infections (from decayed roots of teeth; sinus inflammations, chronic tonsillitis, etc.) and by too much or ill prepared food and malnutrition.

The average man or woman eats too much and lives on badly prepared and unbalanced diet. Usually a regime, if adopted, is the result of lay judgment and advice frequently obtained from a neighbor of some striking article. The way to prevent the adoption of an injurious system of living is to secure the advice of a competent physician after a thorough physical examination has been made.

Human beings vary in their reactions. Their functions change from time to time. Hence the rule should be a yearly health audit and the determination to follow the instructions received.

What has been said regarding the heart and blood vessel diseases applies equally well to kidney diseases. They begin just as insidiously and frequently do not

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

BREAKFAST—Sliced peaches, cereal, thin cream, scrambled eggs with bacon, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Purge of spinach, crostons, vegetable salad, rye bread, grapes, milk, tea.

DINNER—Smoothed veal, mashed potatoes, broiled tomatoes, head lettuce with Russian dressing, whole wheat bread, pecan cubes, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the peaches suggested in the breakfast menu and the Russian dressing with the dinner salad, there are no dishes that are not suitable for a child as young as four years.

The dinner dessert is rather unusual and delicate.

Pecan Cubes

One tablespoon granulated gelatin, 4 tablespoons cold water, 1/2 cup boiling water, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 egg (whites), 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 cup finely chopped pecan meats, 1/2 cup heavy cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar.

Soften gelatin in cold water for 10 minutes. Add boiling water and sugar and stir until dissolved. Put into a pan of ice water, add whites of eggs and beat with a Dover beater until mixture thickens. When cool add vanilla. Dip a shallow square pan in cold water. Turn in pudding and let stand until thoroughly chilled and firm. Remove from pan, cut in 2-inch squares and roll in nuts. Coat as thickly as possible with the nuts. Serve with cream whipped and sweetened with powdered sugar.

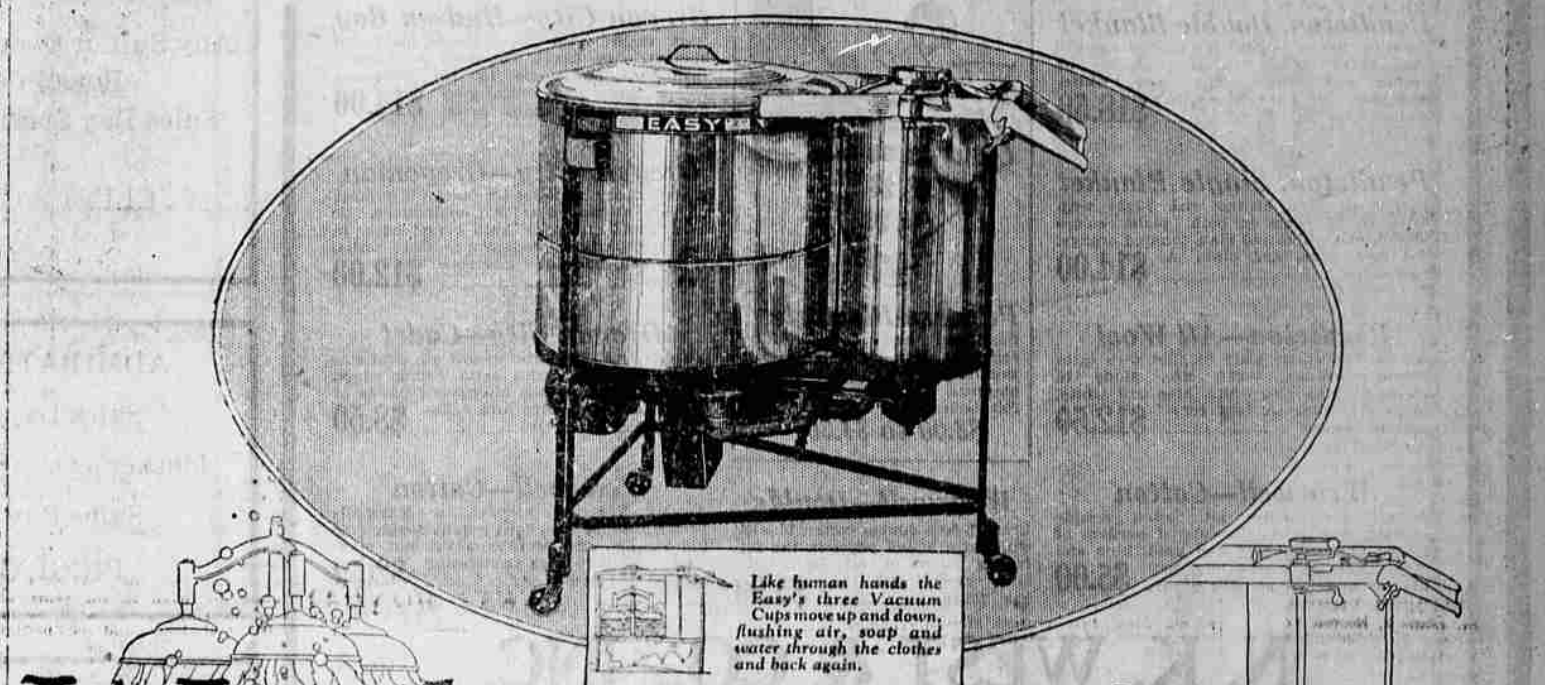

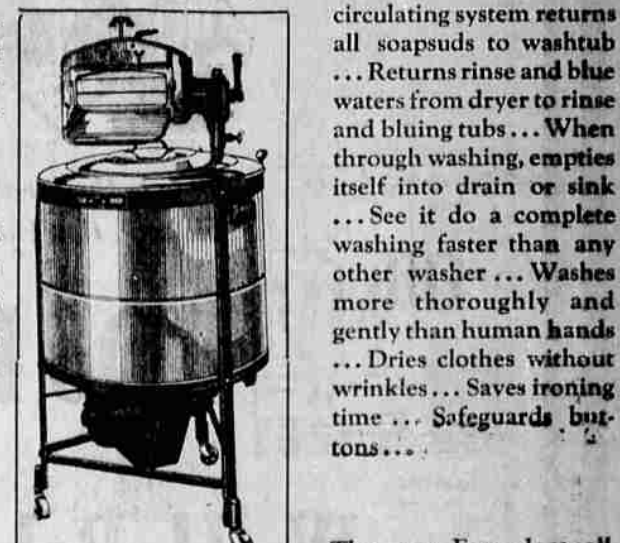
