Education To Be Glorified From Pulpits

Nazarene College Head and Local Pastor to Talk to Students

With a college president delivering a message from one pulpit, and the pastors of several other churches addressing their sermons to the young people who are going to school and college tomorrow's service of Nazarene Christianity's emphasis on education.

Purification Move Launched in Salem
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 11. (AP)—A movement to bring about the purification of Oregon streams by the scientific disposal of sewage was launched here yesterday at a meeting attended by 100 representatives of state, counties and municipalities. The meeting was called by Dr. Frederick D. Strickler, state health officer. Mayor Baker, of Portland, was elected president of the organization, to be known as the Oregon Anti-Pollution league.
