BREAKFAST—Chilled cantaloupe, cereal, thin cream, creamed fresh beef, crisp bran toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Lima bean timbales, lettuce sandwiches, apple stump, milk, tea.

DINNER—Fish chowder, boiled beets in tart sauce, tomato and pineapple salad, peach pie, rice bread, milk, coffee.

The sauce for the beets can be made with lemon juice, vinegar or orange juice. The sauce using lemon or orange juice has more food value if the juice is added just before serving and not boiled with the sauce. Make the sauce thick enough to thin to the right consistency with the fruit juice.

Lima Bean Timbales
Two cups cooked lima beans, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 egg, 1-4 cup chopped nut meats, 1-3 teaspoon pepper, 1-2 teaspoon salt.

Put beans through a sieve. Melt butter, add minced onion and simmer, stirring frequently until tender but not discolored. Beat egg and add to bean pulp with onion, salt, pepper and nuts. Mix thoroughly and put in timbale molds or small custard cups. Place

CAPITAL DUE TO RESUME ACTIVITY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Notwithstanding the congressional campaign, which is giving politicians in their home states and districts something to think about, Washington will begin to wake up, congressionally speaking, about the middle of September.

There always is a great deal to do at a "short session" of congress, which convenes this year on Dec. 6, and not much time to do it in. Actual legislation can't start—in the absence of a special call by the president, of which there's little prospect—until the specified date of December, but committees can be getting things in shape to work rapidly in the scant three months before the law ends the 69th congress "sine die."

The administration is particularly anxious to get things "snuggled down" next winter, because of apprehensions—of course not admitted, but felt, beyond any question—that it will lose control of the senate at the November elections. If so, the coming "short session"

of the dying congress will be its last chance to get its policies acted on as it wants them acted on.

Once acted on thus, the administration assumes that matters will "run their course" for the ensuing two years, inasmuch as it doesn't expect to lose control of the house of representatives, too, however much it may be worrying about the senate.

The senate alone can't do any repealing. Even in the somewhat improbable event of a completely democratic congress, the president can veto anything he dislikes, and it's unbelievable that the democrats will make gains enough to override a presidential veto.
