EAST RESPECTS WESTERN TEAMS

Coaching Staff at Harvard Made up of Men from Open Spaces

It took western football a long time to win deserved recognition in the college east.

Since football traditions are strongly linked with the east, Harvard, Yale and Princeton playing a prominent part, it was but natural that the west would have its troubles breaking into the college circle.

Perhaps the finest compliment that western football has received in some time is contained in the list of coaches recently selected to handle the football situation at Harvard this fall.

Arnold Horween, who succeeds Bob Fisher as head football coach, is a resident of Chicago, thoroughly familiar with western football, is apparently of the opinion that an infusion of western blood into the Harvard coaching system will help.

In naming the former football stars who will direct gridiron destinies at Harvard, Horween has departed from old-time Harvard customs in appointing as his assistants players who have shined other than at Harvard.

Carney and Brader
Two former Big Ten stars, Carney of Illinois and Brader of Wisconsin, will assist Horween in an effort to give Harvard the upper hand over grid opponents in general and Yale and Princeton in particular.

Carney was a great end at Illinois. The late Walter Camp in 1920 honored him as one of the wing selections on his All-American team. Carney will have charge of the Crimson ends.

Jim Brader played both tackle and guard at Wisconsin and performed brilliantly in both positions. He will be Harvard's line coach.

For three years Brader has occupied such a position at University of Wisconsin. Last season he was a big help to Coach George Little in turning out one of the best eleven Wisconsin has had in years.

The west will be far more interested in Harvard than usual this year, because two famous stars of that section will assist in the coaching of the Crimson candidates.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 15. (AP)—With the gates closed to the public Jack Dempsey started on his final stretch of training today.

Guards were stationed at the entrances of the greyhound racing track with instructions to permit nobody to enter with the exception of newspaper correspondents.

Dempsey will work out before the critics again tomorrow and on Friday he will take another lay-off. Then, on Saturday the work-out will become a strictly private, with even the newspapermen barred.

While there are rumors that Dempsey intends to perfect some new mysterious punch or defense, he merely desires to go through his pace unhampered by prying eyes.
