Each guest was presented with an Indian headband and a long feather as she entered, the headband bearing the name of the wearer and her tribe.

Mrs. Claude Cooper opened the program with two vocal selections, "Pale Moon" and "From the Land of the Sky Blue Water," accompanied by Mrs. E. A. Kinnaman, after which Miss Mina Cooper, president of the auxiliary for the current year, gave a short talk of welcome. All of the "Indians" present then joined in a war dance, which served to set everyone into the spirit of the meeting.

Mrs. Ralph Clark followed with two piano solos. She is a new addition to the musical circles of the community and is said to be a gifted pianist.

Each of the "tribes" present, with the aid of Indian blankets and the collection of garments gathered by the Ladies Aid society for the next rummage sale, put on a scene of Indian history. The episodes enacted included Pocahontas and John Rolfe at the court of Queen Anne, Sacagawea leading Lewis and Clark, William Penn smoking the pipe of peace with the Indian chiefs, the Whitman massacre, and the moving of Chief Joseph's remains.

A happy and informal evening was closed by the serving of appropriate refreshments by the committee in charge of the meeting. Sister Mary Says:

Breakfast—Baked pears, cereal, thin cream, codfish balls, corn bread, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Corn soufflé, cabbage salad with sour cream dressing, whole wheat bread, peppers, tomato and cucumber salad, peach cream pie, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Corn soufflé is a delicious, hearty luncheon dish but also makes an unusually good vegetable entre for the company dinner. Children as young as five years may be allowed to eat this dish.

Children under ten years of age should be served cabbage very finely minced and seasoned with lemon juice, salt and a bit of sugar.

Corn Soufflé
Six ears corn, 1 cup soft bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, yolks 2 eggs, whites 3 eggs.

Score corn through center of each row with a sharp knife and scrape out pulp. Melt butter, stir in bread crumbs and milk and cook, stirring constantly until smooth. Add corn and cook a few minutes longer. Season with salt and pepper and add yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry and fold into corn mixture. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake 20 minutes in a moderately hot oven. When firm to the touch, the soufflé is done. Serve at once or it will fall.
