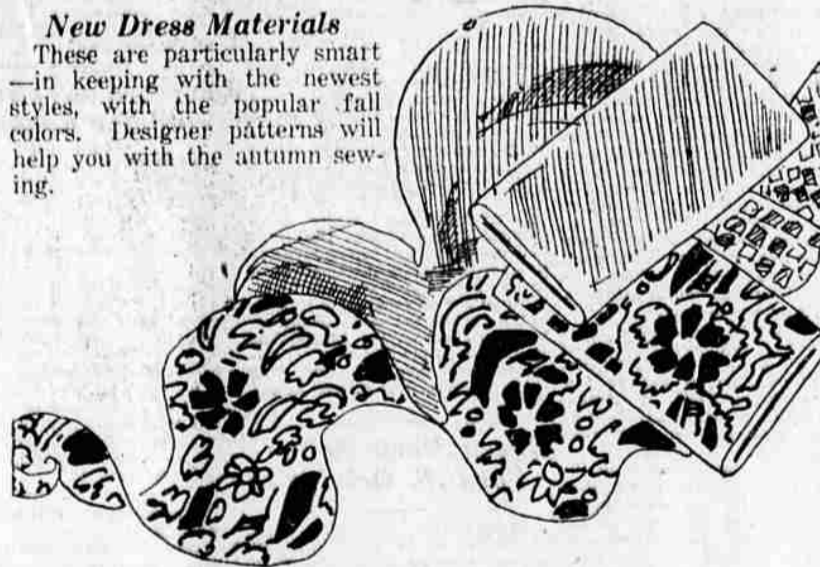

## Second Petition Filed In Willos And Kelley Case

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 15. (AP)—A second petition for rehearing in the case of the state against Elmer Willos and James Kelley was filed in the state supreme court Wednesday by Judge Will H. King, of Portland their attorney.

One of the main points in the appeal was that the lower court erred in its instructions to the jury and that point is renewed in the second petition for rehearing. Another point is that the defendants were indicted as private citizens but tried as convicts and that there is a special statute for the trial of convicts which was not followed in their trial. This, Judge King holds is a conflict between the executive and the judicial departments of the executive department. To try them properly, he holds, a writ of habeas corpus would have been necessary.

For the reason that all seven justices of the supreme court heard the arguments on appeal, Judge King will insist that all must be present when his second petition for rehearing is passed on, including Justice John L. Rand, who is ill in a hospital in Portland.

## PHY RETURNS FROM MEET IN THE DALLES

HOT LAKE, Sept. 15. (Special)—That the recent Eastern Oregon medical meeting and the quality of the papers presented when it was held here recently have received wide attention and much praise throughout the northwest was again proved yesterday, according to Dr. W. T. Phy, president of the state board of health and retiring president of this section's organization of medical men. He returned early this morning from The Dalles where he addressed physicians of the Central Oregon and Washington districts who had gathered there in annual session. More than an hour of the evening program was devoted to a eulogistic review of the August meeting here, says Dr. Phy.

Dr. Frederick Stricker, executive secretary of the state board of health, Dr. Ray C. Matson, of Portland, and Dr. Phy were the three medical men, non-members of the Columbia district organization, who addressed the meeting.

the direct result of the application of preventive measures obtained through a knowledge of the causes of the preventable diseases.

American citizens, as well as those of other lands, have reaped the benefit of the investigations of scientists who have given the best of their life and thought in an endeavor to ascertain the cause and prevention of disease.

Practically all research institutions have been built, equipped and manned during this period than during any five hundred years previously.

Could any stronger argument be advanced in favor of the establishment of such an institution? Can we expect to go forward or even maintain our present position without them? Can such institutions be built and maintained as they should be without the hearty co-operation of all the beneficiaries? The answer is very evident.

Preventive medicine is the watch-word of the hour. Much is yet to be accomplished, not only in attaining a knowledge of the cause of disease, but also in its prevention and cure. The whole

people are the beneficiaries and they will gladly enter into this work if sufficiently informed of its benefits, both from hygienic and economic standpoints.

It is fitting then, that North and South America, especially, pay due tribute to the great and lamented Gorgas through whose work these countries have been freed of yellow fever, by establishing an institution at Panama for the study of tropical diseases.

The Panama Canal is a blessing to all lands and nations, today largely as a result of Gorgas' ability to obliterate yellow fever from the canal zone. It is through research work done in such institutions that great epidemics are prevented and humanity spared great suffering to say nothing of the financial advantages derived therefrom.
