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Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Orange juice, cereal, top milk, broiled bacon, scrambled eggs, cereal whole wheat toast, milk coffee.

LUNCHEON—Macaroni loaf, celery and cheese sandwiches, grapes, white butter cake, milk tea.

DINNER—Roast, shoulder of lamb, buttered rice, baked carrots, combination vegetable salad, peach bavarian cream cake, brain rolls, milk, coffee.

The same cake is planned for the dinner menu that is used for luncheon. This is an unusually good white cake recipe. The cake keeps moist for several days and can be baked in a loaf or layers, baked in layers it makes a good birthday cake.

White Butter Cake
One-half cup butter, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 1/4 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 teaspoon salt, whites 4 eggs.

Cream butter and gradually add sugar. Cream mixture thoroughly and add vanilla. Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder and add alternately with milk to first mixture. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry and fold into batter. Turn into an oiled and floured loaf cake pan and bake fifty minutes in a moderate oven. If you bake by temperature, 350 to 475 degrees Fahrenheit should be maintained.

BRILLIANCE FOR THE MAY GARDEN

Without the May-flowering tulips the flower garden doesn't get into full action until well into June. But with May-flowering tulips planted in every available vacancy it blazes into a glory of coloring about the second week of May that is unequalled at any other season of the year. The May-flowering tulips are the most largely planted bulbs in the world and the number is increasing each year and deservedly so for there is no greater brilliancy so easily obtained nor in such a wide range of coloring with so many delicate shadings.

These tulips are notable for their height, at stately growth as compared with the early tulips, two-foot stems being common, some reaching a height of 30 inches. Of all the May-flowering tulips the Darwins, introduced in Holland in the early nineties, are by far the most popular, due to their great size and handsome coloring. They are cup-shaped, with rounded petals and their color range is from white through all manner of pinks, rose, red, to almost black on the red scale and a similar gradation in the lavender and purple.

There are no pure yellows in the Darwins, although one new break for the first time brings some yellow.

The Darwins are favorite material for those who like to arrange color plans for their garden as the variety is so large that there is the widest latitude in planting. They should be planted in groups of from six to hundreds. One of the favorite plantings is to use the tulips with a ground cover, forget-me-nots with pink and rose tulips; the lavender of the wood phlox with the pinks, the rich crimson, maroons and scarlets against a background of the gray foliage of the grass pinks or cerastium.

When planted with a ground cover the bulbs should be set about a foot each way. When bedded for their gorgeous mass effect they should be set from six to eight inches apart and five inches deep. Singly and in small groups they should be tucked into the hardy border in every vacancy.
