"FRAME" PLOT BARED
LOS ANGELES, Sept. 16. (AP)—The Times says a third and independent attempt to "frame" evidence in the Almoor Semple McPherson case was reported to the district attorney's office yesterday by Nick Harris, head of a local detective agency. Search for Harris L. Melosh, salesman for a local beach club, was started by authorities last night in an effort to question him concerning the alleged plot.

Melosh's first known entrance into the McPherson case was between August 1 and August 6 when he called on Harris, who was at that time working in behalf of the evangelist.

According to Harris' account of the meeting, Melosh introduced himself as "Mr. Roberts" and frankly told Harris that Mrs. McPherson needed assistance and that he could supply all necessary details to substantiate her kidnapping story.

"You need a shack, 'Miss X', a bathing suit and the route the kidnapers followed," quoted Melosh adding that his visitor concluded the introduction with the boast "and I am the one who can supply them."

"Just how do you expect to get this evidence, frame it?" Harris said he asked the visitor.

"How else do you think I could get it," the detective said Melosh countered.

Harris declared his visitor informed him that he had placed his proposition before Mrs. Kennedy last night and that he had not reached a "financial agreement" at that time.

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DAWES RENEWS FIGHT ON RULES

NEW YORK, Sept. 16. (AP)—Present senate rules provide a sinister instrument quietly and continually used by individuals and minorities to modify for personal and political purposes the form of current legislation of all kinds.

Vice President Dawes declared here last night in an address at a dinner of the radio industries.

Renewing his campaign for a modification of the rules so a majority of the senate might prevent filibustering against revenue and appropriation bills, General Dawes asserted that at times the open filibuster seemed to be engaged in only as a reminder to the majority of what the minority as individuals could do to other legislation if they were appeased by its modification.

Calling attention that the bulk of the bills passed by the senate are put through by unanimous consent, General Dawes said the frequency with which proceedings under unanimous consent were resorted to was "conclusive proof not only of the inadequacy of the present rules, but of the greatness of the power of obstruction which they give to every individual senator."
