

168 CANDIDATES NOW CERTIFIED

Three Independent Candidates Promise to Add Zest to Election

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 17.—According to the official ballot, as certified by Secretary of State Kozar to the various county clerks 168 ambitious seekers after public office will be in the race at the coming November election, seeking election from United States senator to district attorney. Two independent candidates for senator, one for governor add a touch of the unusual to the certified list. The full list of candidates, as certified by Kozar, is as follows:

Favor 2-Grade Apple Pack In The Northwest

WENATCHEE, Wash., Sept. 17.—Despite that a meeting of north central Washington apple growers, held here to consider the proposition of taking a two-grade apples out of the boxed class, was on the verge of a breakdown several times a resolution was unanimously adopted, after three hours' discussion that the meeting go on record favoring a two-grade pack. The resolution follows:

"Resolved that it is the sense of this meeting that each growing district meet with representatives of other districts at Wenatchee September 18 for the purpose of organizing and electing an executive committee, whose duty it will be to take steps to change the grading rules to provide that only two grades be packed in boxes, this committee to recommend experimental disposition of inferior apples, beginning at once."

First Halibut of Season Are Caught

ASTORIA, Sept. 17.—The first halibut of the fall fishing season was brought into port here by the halibuter Cape Clear, which discharged at the Burke Packing company.

She brought 5,000 pounds of halibut and 5,000 pounds of black cod. The halibut was in the small sizes, most of the fish being of the "chicken" grade and of fine quality.

The Cape Clear found fair fishing on the banks and it is probable that all of the larger offshore fishing boats will convert from trolls to halibut gear within a few days if the salmon trolling does not increase materially.

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Dobbin Herd of Sheep Enriched By 2 New Rams
