Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Bananas, cereal, thin cream, soft cooked eggs, crisp whole wheat toast, marmalade, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Sweetish, brown bread and butter sandwiches, peach custard pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Veal stew with dumplings, scalloped tomatoes, fresh pear salad, pumpkin pie, graham bread, milk, coffee.

Keep in mind the necessity of scraping a banana before serving. Use a silver knife and gently but thoroughly remove the coating just next to the skin. Then cut the fruit in slices or return to the skin and serve with salt.

Peach Custard Pudding—Four or six peaches, 1 cup broken nut meats, 1 1/2 cups milk, 2 eggs (yolks), 6 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon flour, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix and sift sugar, flour and salt. Beat yolks of eggs slightly with dry ingredients. Heat milk and gradually add to egg mixture, beating constantly. Beat until sugar is dissolved. Cook over hot water until custard coats the spoon. Remove from heat and add vanilla. Pure and slice peaches. Put in a serving dish and sprinkle with nuts, reserving a few for the top of the pudding. Pour hot custard over nuts and peaches. Sprinkle with remaining nuts and put on ice to chill.

GIVE THE BABY A CHANCE (By J. W. Ames, M. D., Denver, Colo.)

Member Gorgas Memorial Institute The idea has gradually spread the offspring of human beings have the inalienable right of being born free from disease or disease tendencies. To this end suitable marriage laws, eliminating the diseased and socially unfit, have been drafted and incorporated into the statutes of many of our commonwealths.

While these enactments are recent, and while the primal object of marriage is a sentimental one, not directed toward the improvement of the race, the lapse of years will undoubtedly demonstrate that the prevention of marriage among those diseased in mind or body must serve potently in the reduction of mortality in early life.

If we consider the transmission of syphilis alone, we are humiliated and astounded before the facts presented on every hand. Williams estimates that it is the cause of 26 per cent of prenatal deaths, the difficulty of diagnosis in pregnant women, except through the impracticable Wasserman test, being well recognized. Morrow found that where the father alone is infected, the infant mortality is about 38 per cent; where both father and mother are infected it is 60 to 70 per cent.

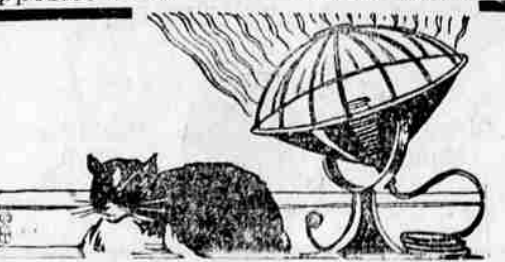
Only a little short of the toll exacted by this major plague comes the endless misery arising from the use of alcohol.
