The Examiner last night Mrs. H. C. Ormiston, mother of Kenneth G. Ormiston, declared that she was "tired of all this deception," and called upon her son to tell the authorities the truth concerning his part in the McPherson disappearance.

"With this great mass of evidence showing that Mrs. McPherson was not kidnapped, with the warrants issued for her arrest, there is no use for even a mother to try to persuade herself that the story told by my son is true," Mrs. Ormiston said.

"Nothing But Trouble"

"We always loved Kenneth so, and were proud of him, our youngest son, because he was so bright. We tried to bring him up as a God-fearing, righteous man and until he met Mrs. McPherson there was nothing to mar our joy and our pride in him.

"Since then there has been nothing but trouble. When Kenneth sent his letters to the district attorney we were hurt. For in them our son confessed a wrong, but we believed them. Now we cannot, there is too much on the other side. He must come forward and tell the truth to clear up this mess which has kept us in constant misery since his name was first brought into the investigation.

"I would like to have him here tonight where I could advise him. And that advice would be no matter whom it hurts nor how hard it is, Kenneth, tell the truth."
