EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 20 (AP)—Maxwell Victor Whipple, 26, was killed Saturday, shortly after noon, while deer hunting in the vicinity of Mosby Creek, 12 miles from town, and about 17 miles from Cottage Grove. It was the first hunting casualty of the year in Lane county.  
He was apparently killed from a shot from his own gun, a 30-30 caliber rifle. No inquest was held.
