GARNISHEE NOW FACES DEMPSEY

Jack Kearns Secures Attachment—Champion Charges Theft

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21. (AP)—An attachment for Jack Dempsey's share of the purse when he fights Gene Tunney Thursday night was issued in common pleas court today at the request of counsel for Jack Kearns, Dempsey's former manager.

Tex Rickard was named as garnishee and the bail to secure Dempsey's assets was fixed at \$400,000.

Kearns is suing for money alleged to be due him under the terms of his former contract with the heavyweight champion, covering the last three years.

Granting of the attachment, which came as a surprise move, took place in common pleas court No. 5, while Rickard's attorneys were arguing in common pleas court No. 4 against the issuance of an injunction restraining Rickard from paying Dempsey and Tunney any money in advance of the fight in violation of the Pennsylvania law. This action was started last week by a "tax payer and ticket holder," representing Kearns.

DEMPSEY

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. Sept. 21. (AP)—Jack Dempsey in an affidavit presented in chancery court today answering Jack Kearns' suit, forcing him into receivership, charged Kearns with stealing \$200,000.

Dempsey gave this as his reason for discharging Kearns. The case was continued for two weeks.

Dempsey also charged Kearns was at one time imprisoned on a serious charge.

J. B. Smith, member of the Union Pacific's trap shooting team, left La Grande yesterday on his way to the world's championship railroad meet at the sequoia-national exposition in Philadelphia September 23 to 25 inclusive. Mr. Smith is one of the party of athletes winners in the recent Union Pacific system athletic meet at Cheyenne. Dr. R. G. McCall, district surgeon, of Huntington, is also a member of the team.

Others in the party representing the Union Pacific who will go to Philadelphia are George Hartley, of Omaha, molybdenum and spring relays; Earl Wedberg, Omaha, weights and discs; Edwin Reeter, North Platte, springs and relays; H. S. Hoover, Omaha, horse-shoe pitching; Chester Danielson, Omaha, springs; C. E. Nelson, G. J. Adkinson and Max Welch, of Gr. River, 400-yards freestyle and Bruce Gave, Nampa, trapshooting; A. O. Chissold, Salt Lake, springs and relays; Ray Banks, Milford, high jump and sprints; W. J. Nicoll, Portland, men's tennis; and Mary O'Malley, Pocatello, women's tennis.

At Philadelphia these athletes will meet other picked athletes from 18 large railway systems in the United States and Canada in competition for gold, silver and bronze commemorative sequoia-national medals.
