BREAKFAST — Chilled apple sauce, cereal cooked with raisins, thin cream, codfish and potato puffs, sliced tomatoes, corn meal muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Scalloped spinach and tomatoes, graham bread, pumpkin pie, milk, tea.

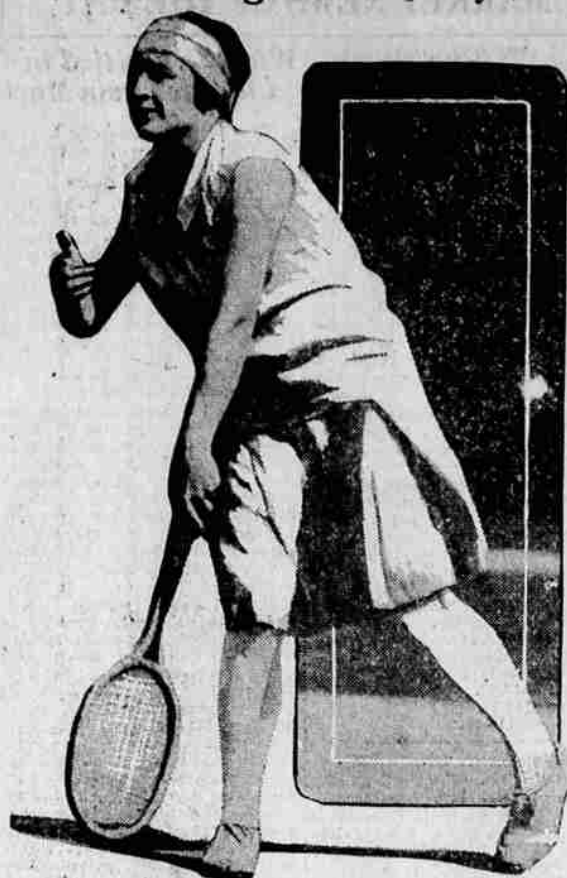
DINNER — Salisbury Steak, creamed potatoes, French fried onions, celery and cabbage salad, sliced peaches, fudge cake, bran rolls, milk, coffee.

School children must have a hearty breakfast to help them through the day. Very often the noon meal is hurried and eaten under a certain amount of tension so the breakfast plays a most important part in the child's diet.

Two pounds spinach, 4 tomatoes, 1/2 onion, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 3/4 cup fine dried bread crumbs, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons grated cheese. Wash spinach and cook in its own juice. Chop very fine. Peel tomatoes and cut in slices. Mince onion. Put a layer of dried crumbs into a well-buttered baking dish. Cover with a layer of sliced tomatoes and sprinkle with onion, salt, pepper and sugar. Dot generously with butter and cover with a layer of spinach. Continue layer for layer of crumbs, tomatoes, seasoning and spinach until all is used. Cover with buttered crumbs, sprinkle with cheese and bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve from baking dish.

CONVICTS IN HOSPITAL

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 22 (AP).—R. V. Haworth and H. S. Brookhart, both sentenced in Douglas county to serve a year in the state penitentiary for shoplifting, are in the prison hospital, both with broken collar bones and other injuries, caused by an automobile accident while on the way to Salem yesterday afternoon.

The two prisoners were being brought to Salem by Deputy Sheriff J. G. Hodges and his son, of Roseburg. A short distance south of Jefferson a car that was traveling ahead of the Hodges car suddenly skidded and speeded. Hodges, to avoid a collision, put on his brakes, with the result that his car turned turtle, rolling over several times.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP).—The week of October 2 was designated as fire prevention week in a proclamation today by President Coolidge.

Griffith Wins Suit Against Al Jolson

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP).—A verdict for \$2,627.25 against Al Jolson, comedian, in the suit for \$57,145 for alleged breach of contract brought by D. W. Griffith, Inc., was returned by a jury in federal court Tuesday.

The suit resulted from an alleged agreement by Jolson to act in a motion picture to be made by Griffith. Jolson, however, after viewing a trial run of the film, said he realized he would not be successful as a movie actor and refused to continue with the plan. He denied any contract ever had been signed. Griffith asked damages for money he claimed he expended in preparation for the film, which was to have been known as "Mammy's Boy."

BRYANT SCORES WITH HIS VIOLIN

Local Musician Gains Praise—Fair Crowd Attends Recital

Although several other events were taking place last evening requiring the attention of many La Grande people the Presbyterian church auditorium was fairly well filled for the recital in which Leo Cullen Bryant, violinist, was presented by the Eastern Oregon school of music. Mr. Bryant was assisted by Jessie A. Hoskins, soprano, of Baker.

Last night was Mr. Bryant's first public appearance in La Grande and he proved himself to be a real artist with the violin, members of the audience declare. During the rendition of his numbers the audience was so quiet the drop of a pin could be heard.

He opened his program with "Nocturn in E Flat" by Chopin. Sarate, which was followed by a group of three numbers "Menuett" by Mozart, "Le Cygne" by Saint-Saens and "L'Abetille" by Schubert. One of the numbers in his last group "Serenade in A Major" by Dvorak, he added an original cadenza.

After his last selection "Zigeunerweisen" by Sarasate the applause was so enthusiastic that he was compelled to return for the third encore number. One of his encore selections "Gypsy Dance" was particularly well received by the audience.

Mrs. Hoskins who gave a group of four selections was also enthusiastically received. Mrs. Hoskins has appeared on several occasions before and her programs are always looked forward to.

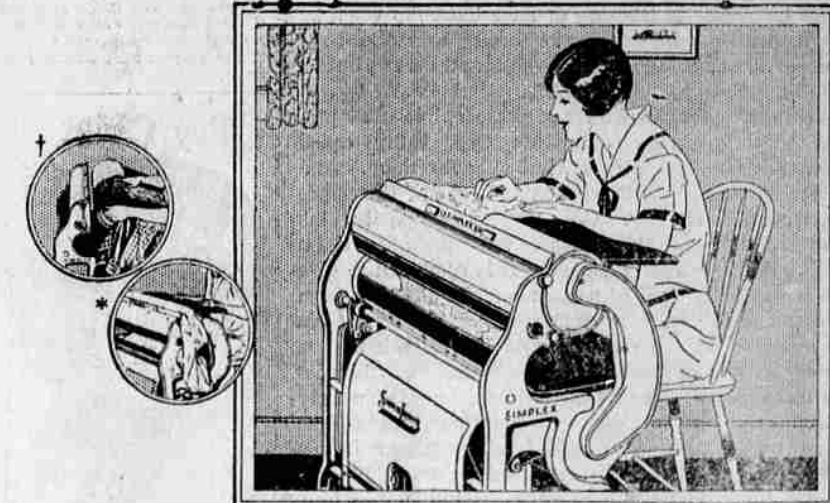

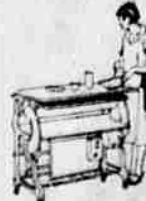
