Sister Mary Says:

SISTER MARY—Womans pg BREAKFAST—Orange juice, cereal, top milk, broiled bacon, scrambled eggs, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Salmon salad, whole wheat bread, Brother Jonathan, milk, tea.

DINNER—Fricassee of lamb, mashed potatoes, creamed carrots, endive and tomato salad, whole wheat bread, plum pudding.

Equal parts of salmon and peas are combined with half as much diced celery for the luncheon menu. A tart salad dressing is added to make quite moist and the salad is served in lettuce cups. A spoonful of real mayonnaise dropped on the top of each serving adds to the richness of the salad and a sprinkling of minced parsley adds to the color.

Plum Pudding—One cup plum pulp, 2 oranges, 1 cup granulated sugar, 3 bananas, 1 cup heavy cream, graham crackers.

Roll enough graham crackers to make about 1½ cups. Mash bananas, using a silver fork. Squeeze juice from oranges and press

plum pulp through sieve. Cover a well buttered baking dish with crumbs. Add banana and plum pulp. Sprinkle with sugar and pour over orange juice. Cover with remaining crumbs and "sprinkle" with thick cream. Bake 25 or 30 minutes and serve warm with plain or whipped cream or a plain corn-starch sauce.
