PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 25 (AP)—Gene Tunney thinks Jack Dempsey is "a good sport." That's what the new world's heavyweight champion said today in referring to his defeated adversary, after making a courtesy call on him.

Tunney spent an hour as Dempsey's guest in the former champion's hotel suite.

Greeting his foe of the ring with an outstretched hand, which he said was "a bit tender" Tunney expressed the hope that Dempsey was "coming along all right."

Dempsey thrust out his hand and told the new champion he was glad he had come.

"I always thought you were a great champion," said Tunney. "And I want to say now that you are a fine, clean opponent, and fought as clean and game a fight as any man who has been in a ring. Anyone can be proud to have met you in the fight you made."

Dempsey talked with a smile that made it difficult to believe that he had been in a desperate battle with his guest.

Dempsey assured his visitor that he would be over the effects of the fight in a few days. Dempsey expressed concern about his closed eye, which he said was not healing as rapidly as he thought it should.

**NEW SOURCES OF RUBBER**

The American Chemical Society has been having a discussion of the rubber situation. The guayule shrub is brought forward by chemists as a new source of rubber which can be grown in "mildly frostbitten climates," thus having a great advantage over the present rubber plant, which is limited to tropical climates. David Spence and G. H. Carnahan, rubber experts, are urging its cultivation.

Now comes Juan Avaristo Anchondo, druggist, chemist and Mexican consul at Tucson, Ariz., with the statement that the gum from the creosote shrub, which grows wild freely in the southwestern states and northern Mexico, may revolutionize the whole rubber industry.

It is plain that before long we shall have occasion to thank Great Britain for putting on the screws. Nothing like a little pinch to start people in search of other resources. Probably in the next ten years there will be a dozen rubber possibilities, with tires becoming cheap as doughnuts.

And just about then, somebody will come along with something which makes tires unnecessary altogether. It's a funny world, but always interesting. What we need right now, if our petroleum supply will really last only six years, is a substitute for gasoline.

**HOT DOG EYESORES**

More power to the American Automobile association in its campaign in favor of better hot dog kennels!

President Thomas P. Henry of the A. A. A. has appealed to all the clubs in that big organization, asking them to join in a movement to improve the "thousands of unwashed, unpainted and unsanitary hot dog stands and other lunch counters that infest so many of our beautiful thoroughfares."

Many of the stands, he remarks, are made out of signs furnished by soda, pop, candy and cracker manufacturers. Even when the buildings are fundamentally decent, they are often cluttered all over with such signs. Thus they are marring landscape beauty and are eyesores to the motorists they seek to attract.

"The situation," he says, "is not confined to any section of the country. It is offsetting all that is being done to beautify the highways, and millions of motorists are rising in protest. The hot-dog vendor or the lunch counter keeper has a perfect right to make a living, but he has no right to mar the rights of sight-seers everywhere. In this respect the rights of the public are paramount."

He believes that such places may be controlled and made more respectable and presentable by means of restrictions enforced in granting the license privilege. Many, however, deserve to be abolished simply as public nuisances. Other countries do not have such eyesores all along the road, compelling the unwilling attention of the traveler by their hideousness. Why should the United States have them?
