Notorious Thief, Of Pennsylvania, Again in Prison

PHOENIXVILLE, Pa. Sept. 27 (AP)—Abe Buzard, notorious chicken thief, is behind prison bars again.

His life has consisted of 31 years of freedom, much of which was spent in chicken and other petty thievery, and 43 years spent in jail in repentance, study and evangelism.

With two companions, he was arrested yesterday in the hills of North Coventry township, with a wagon load of chickens, and three and other articles alleged to have been gathered during a night's raid on neighboring farms.

His arrest brought to an end one of the longest stretches of freedom Abe had enjoyed since he was a boy. Each term in a cell has found him more determined than ever to reform and to go out into the world as an evangelist to atone.

His determination usually vanished quickly. He was sentenced to 10 years in the county jail.

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the frame through which the pit-firer smoked. Dozens of cameras clicked.

The procession was to have formed in Joseph at 10 o'clock. Gathering hundreds watched from the hillside. But the parade as far as eye could see was still the swift somber-hued line of oncoming spectators.

Funeral Dirge Sounds
Finally at about 11:15 o'clock, the highly colored color. On the still air came the wind-like wail of the funeral dirge.

Chief MacFarland, with his feathered headpiece, led the procession and the mourning. Behind his pony dragged the tandem poles with their honored burden. Then the mounted braves: the backs with pied-blanketed squaws and children; motor-loads of more affluent tribesmen, escorted by a cow-boy-mounted guard of white-skinned neighbors.

Into the burying grounds MacFarland led them. Once around the monument they rode and stopped. MacFarland conferred with white men. He posed. His people posed. Tripod cameras clicked.

More weird dirges, into which the squaws from the fires, all but two, were drawn.

Praises Joseph
Backed by Chief Francis, a grave old figure in black and white striped blanket stepped forward and spoke. His words were Nez Perce, but his tones and his gestures were eloquent even to the whites. They knew he said that Old Chief Joseph was a good man; that he loved his people; his country; and his God.

Then the white chief, Irving E. Vining, faced the crowds. Chief Francis, he said, would address them—Chief Francis, a direct descendant of the Old Chief Joseph. White man and red man clasped hands.

MacFarland walked to and fro. "My country! My country!" he said.

Then, still pacing, he told how he was descendant of the Joseph, of the tribe that signed the treaty with Governor Stevens at Walla Walla in 1855 so that the white men might come in peace to build their homes. He recalled his boyhood on the banks of the Wallawa river. He had seen the spirit of the air play in lighting on the mountains and had heard the spirit of the storm roll his wrath along the mighty peaks, and after the storm had spent, he had seen the peace of the great spirit settle over the Wallawa country.

It was a great country, he said. Old Chief Joseph had loved it.

All Sing America
"All join in," he commanded with uplifted arm. And while he led, the 2,000 and the band, out of Nez Perce sang softly, "America." The mountains listened, echoes.

As Francis bowed away, Vining came forward again.

He told the people how the Indians had held this Wallawa country dearly, and how it had been Old Chief Joseph's prayer that the land might never pass from the Nez Perce. Young Joseph had led the greatest retreat in history to make good his promise to his father.

Nez Perce History
First mention of Old Chief Joseph in the white man's annals tells of his meeting with the Missionary Spaulding in 1826. Later the old chief led some of his people to Spaulding's missionary school at Lapwai, Ida. When after the Whitman massacre frightened whites withdrew to the Wallawette valley, the Nez Perce returned to their Wallawa valley. After the peace signed at Walla Walla in 1855, no white ever died at the

hands of a Nez Perce, Vining recounted.

Many times during the life of Old Chief Joseph, the whites made offers to buy the Wallawa country. But he said no. It belonged not to his people but to the Great Spirit. It should never be sold.

So on his death bed he exacted from his people a promise that they never sell their country to the white men. It was in the struggle to keep that promise that Joseph's son gave the world its outstanding example of courageous leadership. Vining told the people.

Then, speaking for William Miller, of La Grande, he presented Chief Francis a portrait of Old Chief Joseph, his grandfather.

Next, in a speech as stirring as anything heard that day, a lad from Enterprise paid tribute to the red men of Wallawa, and expressed the respect with which the eighth graders of Enterprise presented to MacFarland their own schoolroom flag. Two Indian students and a girl from the lad's class followed him with talks on the presentation and acceptance of the banner. More cameras rose and clicked.

That was almost all. Not quite. As the 2,000 whites moved slowly from the hillside, they paused, most of them, at the burial place of old Chief Joseph. And they clasped the hand of Chief Francis MacFarland, the old chief's nearest of kin.

No one knew what the mountains thought.
