AIMEE'S STORY READ IN COURT

Recess Ordered Shortly Afterward Because of Mother's Illness

HALL OF JUSTICE, Los Angeles, Sept. 29 (AP)—Aimee Semple McPherson's testimony before the county grand jury last July when she told them her story of having been kidnapped from the beach and held for ransom, was read in evidence from the transcript here today in municipal court.

The evangelist's testimony did not differ materially from the story she gave the press at the time she appeared at Douglas, Ariz., June 25.

Reading of the transcript consumed most of the morning session of the evangelist's preliminary hearing on charges of criminal conspiracy.

Carter On Stand
William H. Carter, foreman of the 1926 county grand jury which was discharged for alleged irregularities in connection with the McPherson investigation, was on the stand for a few minutes and his testimony laid the foundation for identification of the transcript.

A recess was ordered in the Aimee Semple McPherson hearing today when Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of the evangelist, appeared on the verge of collapse.

Mrs. Kennedy, pale and stumbling, was led from the court room by Mrs. McPherson and attorney Arthur Beach. She was taken into the judge's chambers, the door to which was closed and locked.

A transcript of Mrs. McPherson's testimony before the grand jury was being read when Attorney Gilbert Ross suddenly and asked for a recess. Judge Blake ordered a five-minute intermission but at the expiration of that time he adjourned court until 2 o'clock when it became apparent that Mrs. Kennedy could not return at once.

May Produce "Miss X"
LOS ANGELES, Sept. 29 (AP)—Kenneth G. Orniston, missing radio man and one of the seven persons charged with conspiracy to obstruct justice in the Aimee McPherson case, plans another move in an effort to clear the evangelist in the Carmel cottage episode, according to a letter purporting to come from him and received by Roland Rich Woolley, attorney for Mrs. McPherson.

The radio man in the letter which was forwarded through Edward H. S. Martin, his Chicago attorney and was signed by a typewriter says that Orniston will reveal the mysterious "Miss X" who occupied the cottage with him for ten days beginning May 15, Orniston writes that a new affidavit to be sent the Los Angeles attorney will detail the radio operator's movements from May 10 to June 23, the movements of "Miss X" prior to May 1 and after May 23, so far as they are known to Orniston. The letter was postmarked Chicago and, although necessarily sent several days ago was dated September 28.

Eugene Couple Are Hurt in Car Wreck
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 29 (AP)—Henry Pape, 41, assistant, yard master for the Southern Pacific company at Eugene, and his wife are in a hospital here today following an auto accident on the Pacific highway about four miles north of Salem late last night.

Mrs. Pape had her back broken and sustained a deep cut three inches long across her forehead. Her husband was cut through the chin bone into his teeth.

CAR FOUND WRECKED
Mystery surrounds the finding of wreck and blood-spattered car, said to belong to William Bucknell, of Pendleton, an automobile accessory salesman, near Emigrant Springs Tuesday afternoon. The condition of the car and marks on the ground and trees

indicated that it had turned over four times, according to a report brought here by motorists.

and asserted that "agriculture is admittedly flat on its back," and added that the rural population "is composed of 47 per cent of all our people."

"The democratic party," Senator Phipps concluded, "has reached the state where it is a party national only in its pretensions and without a single national issue on which it can stand with any hope of success," while Senator Bayard declared that "nearly one-half our population has for five years past carried the bag politically and financially for the republican party."

and asked whether Senator Phipps "thinks that such statements as he gave out today will be ratified when the ballots are cast in November."

Primary Report Due
Some speech was added to the debate by the statement of Senator Charles McNary, republican of Oregon and member of the special senate campaign expenditures investigating committee, that the committee would be ready to submit its report on the Pennsylvania and Illinois inquiries in December.

The report, he intimated, would depreciate the expenditures made on behalf of Representative William Vane and Frank L. Smith, republican nominees, and also may be expected to criticize the political activities of the Anti-Saloon league.

NEWARK, Ohio, Sept. 29 (AP)—Endorsement or repudiation of the administration of President Coolidge and policies of the republican party was declared the dominant national issue in the Ohio campaign this fall by U. S. Senator Frank B. Willis at the formal opening of the republican state campaign here today. Senator Willis is opposed for reelection by former Senator Alice Pomeroy.

Legion Extends Time on Contest
Another week has been allowed for the slogan contest being conducted by the American Legion post to find the right slogan for the 1927 state American Legion convention to be held here.

The contest was started last week but so far few suggestions have been received. The slogan must not be more than six words long and must have plenty of snap to it, similar to those used by other towns in previous years. Coos Bay had as their slogan this year "Coos Bay Knows How."

The contest will close next Tuesday evening at six o'clock. The winner will be awarded a prize of \$5 by the legion post. Slogans are to be mailed to Raymond O. Williams, secretary.

Wong Sui Injured Trying to Escape
PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 29 (AP)—Suffering from injuries received when he plunged from a second story window to escape officers, Wong Sui was in a hospital today not expected to recover and facing charges of violating the federal anti-narcotics law.

Officers were waiting at Wong Sui's place for him to return last night and when he arrived they ordered him to throw up his hands. His answer was a dash to the window and a jump to the sidewalk. His back and left arm were broken, and his body was badly bruised.

Monday night federal officers visited the place and reported they found a quantity of opium.

Mose Chavez Is Bound Over to Juvenile Judge

Mose Chavez, one of the four alleged riflers of J. H. Pearce company's jewelry store July 12, who was brought here Monday from Los Angeles, where he was apprehended by the Pinkerton detective agency, has been turned over to the juvenile court.

Arraigned before Justice Hugh E. Brady Tuesday afternoon, Chavez, in answer to the court's question, said that his age was 16 years.

Judge U. G. Couch, of the county court, is waiting to receive the complaint before he sets the time for a hearing.

According to Chavez—sawthyskinned Huckleberry Finn—an American who has served time at Quentin "pulled the job." He had invited the youth in, but Chavez became frightened and ran when they reached the alley behind the jewelry store, he declares.

The work had none of the soft touches of professional burglary in the opinion of J. H. Pearce. Most of the loot was rosary beads and a cheap but shiny watch that a Mexican hand watched him polish the afternoon before the robbery, he recalls articles that might have dazzled the eyes of amateurs, but were not likely to intrigue the fancy of experienced burglars.

The state's case against George Carlyle at the city hall yesterday afternoon ended in his acquittal of a charge of illegal possession by the jury that tried the case under Judge Hugh E. Brady. H. J. Hess was Carlyle's attorney.

H. H. Hopkins and A. E. Green forfeited bonds of \$50 each posted for their appearance to answer illegal possession charges.

William Gruppe and W. H. Williamson, arrested at Elgin Saturday charged with possession of moonshine, were given until 2 p. m. today to enter pleas. H. L. Hess is representing them.

No Roses This Year

Joe Hughes, of Portland, experienced greenhouse man, has been here since August, when the first planting was done, and is in charge of the work.
