Bulls, Bears in Check as Stock Prices Flounder

NEW YORK, Sept. 29. (AP).—The stock market continued to flounder around within a comparatively narrow trading area today, with neither "bulls" nor "bears" able to gain any decided advantage in the day's trading. Uncertainty over the future course of money rates, which was accentuated by an increase from 5% to 5 1/2 per cent in the charge on call loans, cast a damper on bulls' enthusiasm, while the excellent character of current earnings and trade report mitigated against the efforts of speculators for the decline.

Atlantic Coast Line broke a points on the publication of the August earnings report showing net operating income of only \$154,933 as against \$936,111 in the same month last year. Other high grade rails yielded in sympathy. Oils and motors yielded rather readily to selling pressure, Sinclair breaking to a new level for the year in reflection of the adverse court decision on the Teapot Dome case.

The closing was heavy. Speculative issues and various specialties encountered renewed pressure in the late dealings. Warner Bros. "A." Electric Refrigeration, Butterick and Atlantic Gulf and West Indies declined 3 to 4 points. Bolls and motors, however, recovered partially and Commercial Solvents "B" extended its gain to 8 points.

Total sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.

Wheat Prices Move Up; Close Is Strong

CHICAGO, Sept. 29. (By the Associated Press).—Starting unchanged to 1/2c off, the wheat market here scored slight general gains. Corn and oats were easy, corn opening 1/2 to 5/8c off, and showing but little power to rally. Provisions held steady.

Wheat closed strong, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2c net higher; corn 1/2 to 3/4c up; oats showing 1/2 to 3/4c advance and provisions varying from 10c decline to a rise of 37c.
