The Garden

HYACINTHS IN THE GARDEN

There is no more delightful fragrant flower of the year than the hyacinth. The common use of the hyacinth for winter bloom in pots and in glasses has given rise to a widespread belief that it is a tender bulb. It is as hardy as the tulip and narcissus and as fine material for the open garden as it is for the house and a clump of a dozen bulbs in bloom in late April will send up the atmosphere for yards around them.

The hyacinth deserves a wider use in the small garden as a small group will more than repay the rent for its ground space and beds of them are very showy. Their prim contours make them admirable for formal beds near the house. The bulbs will ripen in plenty of time to be lifted to be replaced by cannas, dahlias or caladiums and other summer bedding plants.

They are finest in groups of single colors planted with some color combination. The pale blues and pinks with the whites, the yellows and pale blues, the deep blues and purples and a number of similar combinations are popular and striking.

The finer hyacinths are grown for house culture and it is not necessary to buy the most expensive named varieties for the garden although they make a most magnificent showing. Second-sized bulbs for bedding are sold and mixtures to color are also offered which are the most economical and give a beautiful display.

A bed of 100 is a magnificent sight in early spring. The bulbs should be planted six inches deep and six inches apart, for a fine mass effect.

The Roman hyacinths are not hardy in the North and should be used only for house culture.

The hyacinths should be given a good mulch in the fall and there should be no great rush to remove it in the spring until the blunt noses have been thrust well through the ground. The hyacinth is an early riser in the spring and sometimes when tempted forth too quickly and opening its leaves spring rains fill the leaves and then a freeze may damage them slightly.

Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Grapes, cereal, thin cream, poached eggs on milk toast, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Baked sweetpotato, graham bread, apple-celery and nut salad, floating island, milk, tea.

DINNER—Fried chicken, mashed potatoes, creamed onions, endive and bacon salad, plum junket ice cream, mock angel food, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The egg yolks are used for the dinner salad dressing and the whites in the mock angel-food cake.

The dinner dessert is rather out of the ordinary, but very good. Choose very ripe plums of a sweet variety.

Plum Junket Ice Cream

Two cups milk, 1 cup sugar, 4 teaspoon salt, 2 cups plums, 1 cup whipping cream, 1 junket tablet, 2 tablespoons cold water.

Crush junket tablet and dissolve in cold water. Heat milk, sugar and salt until lukewarm. Stir in, dissolved junket and stir until sugar is dissolved. Turn into freezer and let stand until set. Pack in ice and salt and freeze to a mush. Add plums rubbed through a colander and cream whipped until firm. Mix thoroughly and finish freezing.
