### WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)

The fall in price of cotton, wheat and fruit, the department of agriculture announced today, brought the general index of purchasing power of farm products down from 93 in August, 1925, to 82 this August, the lowest point reached in 26 months.

### Buying Power of Farm Products Drops 11 Points

While the whole price level has been falling the department said in its October report, farm products have fallen faster.

Of the four chief money crops, cotton, wheat and fruits were described as large enough to "depress prices somewhat, notwithstanding the low yield of spring wheat."

"Potatoes on the other hand," the department said, "are neither a large acreage nor have early diggings turned very good yields, so that prices remain relatively strong."

The report added that the total acreages of 21 cultivated crops was about two per cent above that harvested last year.

## Hotel Doorman Drops Bomb in Aimee's Defense

HALL OF JUSTICE, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 1 (AP).—A follower of Aimee Scripps McPherson, Thomas Scott McVie, doorman at the Clark hotel in Los Angeles, dropped a bomb into defense ranks at the evangelist's hearing today, but he dropped it with an apology.

McVie withstood a terrific grilling by the defense counsel, Gilbert, and emerged from the ordeal with his testimony unshaken that he had seen the Angelus Temple pastor at the Clark hotel about 10 o'clock at the morning of May 18 last, or about five hours before he also appeared at the Santa Monica beach.

The hotel doorman, a member of the woman leader's temple flock, had previously said that he hoped his statement would not do his pastor any harm.

The significance of his evidence lay in previous declarations that Mrs. McPherson had not gone down town prior to her trip to the beach when she disappeared.

Walter B. Lambert swore yesterday that he, too, had seen her at the Clark hotel on the morning of May 18 and that at about the same time he had seen her missing radio operator, Kenneth G. Ormiston, at the same place.
