LATE ONIONS TO RETAIL HIGHER

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1 (AP)—Butter and egg prices were steady today.

Country dressed veal and hogs were sluggish in the local market at prices which weakened the middle of the week.

Poultry prices were firm.

Fronts were reported to have damaged potatoes in Yakima valley where they have not been stored in warehouses.

Conditions are favorable for higher prices on late onions. In the Portland wholesale market they are selling now at \$1.40 a bush for the product of the Lake Labish district, while Walla Walla bring \$1.10 a hundred pounds. The price now to growers at shipping points in Wallamette valley is 85c.

This season's onion crop is in storage at shipping points with prospects, producers believe, of prices advancing. Quality is said to be up to any existing demands, the yellow Danvers ranking as premium stock. However, Walla Walla onions, ranking below the Wallamette valley product in quality, find ready sale to consumers through dealers.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"While buyers have been a little less keen for wool this past week, there has been a substantial turnover in the wool market and prices have been fully maintained on the basis of values established a week ago.

"Manufacturers are in an improved position and are able to secure some advances in cloth with the tendency of the market upward all along the line.

"The foreign markets are very buoyant.

"Mohair is higher, in line with sales in this country, which have been made at 60 1/2 to 62 for the best Texas hair and at 55 1/2 to 57 for kid hair.

Scoured wools—Oregon northern, \$1.93 to 1.12; fine and fine medium clothing, 99 1/2 to 95; valley No. 1, 93 1/2 to 95.

Wheat Sags Early But Rallies Some

CHICAGO, Oct. 1 (By the Associated Press)—Opening 3/4 to 1/2 down, the wheat market soon began to sag.

Wheat and oats were easy, on a starting unchanged but soon undergoing a slight decline.

Provisions held about steady.

Wheat closed firm, 1/2 to 1/4 off; corn unchanged to 1/4 off; oats, 1/2 to 3/4 up and provisions varying from 25c decline to a shade advance.

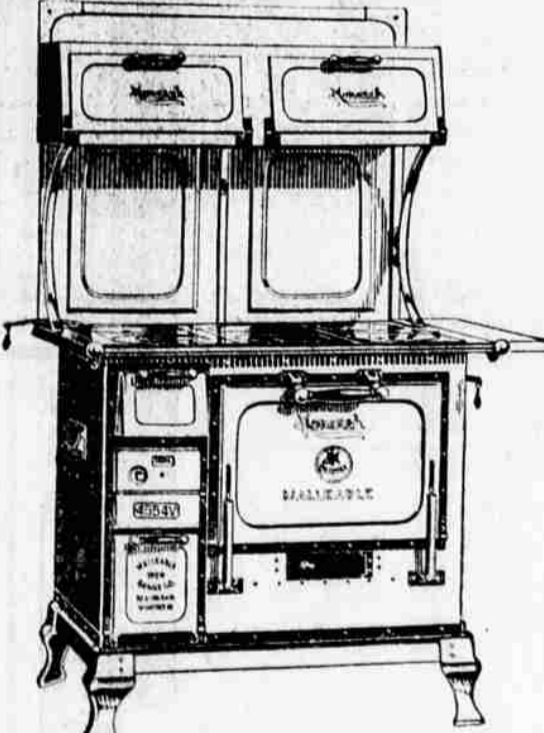
