HEAVY HERE
DURING 1926

Destruction Nears \$50,000 Mark as Winter Season Comes

PREVENTION WEEK
BEGINS TOMORROW

Fire Chief C. O. Murchison Gives Pointers—Warns Against Over-Heated Stoves.

Fire prevention week begins tomorrow—and La Grande has need of one, declares C. O. Murchison, fire chief.

In the last nine months, property losses have totaled higher than for any year since 1923, when the large furniture store burned. Already there have been as many calls on the fire department as are ordinarily answered in a year, and the period of greatest home-fire hazards is just begun.

Year's Damage \$19,085

The destruction of D. Fitzgerald's foundry in June, with a loss of nearly \$40,000, accounts for the greater part of the \$19,085.07 property damages already suffered in La Grande.

But a total of \$258,315.00 worth of property has been at risk from fires in 1926. And that only the extraordinary effectiveness of the city's fire-fighting force saved owners from far greater losses is realized when one considers that the run to the Fitzgerald fire was but one of 65 trips the firemen have made.

Thirty fires caused the loss of \$12,085.97, and which \$22,000.77 has been recovered through insurance. Thirty-five other fires were extinguished without loss. All of the 65 runs except five were made to points inside the city limits.

\$90,000 Block Threatened

On one occasion, a blaze that started in the Weaver tailoring shop on Depot street threatened a block owned by the La Grande Investment company that is valued at \$90,000. The firemen were able to save all but a four-dollar loss. But despite the fire department's efficiency, every uncontrolled flame or drifting spark is a potent danger to life and property.

Urges Precautionary Steps. And Chief Murchison urges every La Grande citizen to observe particular precautions during the next few weeks.

"Dumping hot ashes in wooden boxes and against buildings is one frequent cause of fire that could

Tribute to Dead

Unknown Pioneers Will Be Honored at Meacham Tomorrow

From Baker to Pendleton, dwellers along the Old Oregon Trail are preparing to make a pilgrimage to Meacham tomorrow, where a monument to the memory of the trail's unknown dead will be unveiled. The ceremony will begin at 2 p. m.

The Rev. William Crosby Ross, pastor of the Presbyterian church, will invoke divine blessing on the occasion. Then the stone, erected by the Meacham woman's club, will be presented by Mrs. W. M. Chief, the organization's president, to Walter Meacham, as president of the Old Oregon Trail association. Judge William Duly, chairman of the state highway commission, will draw the tri-colored veil.

Something of the courage and limitless determination of the pioneers who left civilization to care their homes in a trackless wilderness will be recalled in the address by the Rev. Robert C. Lee, of Union, new pastor of the Methodist church at that Oregon Trail town.

Music for the short program will be a soprano solo by Mrs. A. L. Richardson, with melodeon accompaniment by Mrs. George S. Birnie.

In one grave, at Meacham, are buried three unknown heroes the stone will commemorate. In another burning place, about a mile and a half west of Sunset Inn, are resting three others—freighters killed by the Plute and Shoshone Indians while raiding wagon trains in 1878. Their tragic end was recalled through the plans for the monument unveiling to R. Raymond, of Pendleton, who was a member of the government pack train.

SEED SPUDS

Farmers Cooperating in Project, County Agent Reports

QUALITY OF CROP
IS ON INCREASE

Yield of Tubers Also Better Since Selected Seed Has Been in Use in Valley.

Farmers of the Grande Ronde valley, cooperating with the La Grande National bank, are planning to ship in several carloads of seed potatoes to be used in next year's plantings.

The farmers and the bank co-operating have shipped in certified seed for the past four years and it has proved to be of great assistance to the potato industry here. Up until 1922 the potato acreage in Grande Ronde valley was gradually decreasing, largely due to the poor quality of seed planted. It is said. The first certified seed was planted that year and since then the yields have been increased on an average of almost 100 per cent and in extreme cases as high as 400 per cent, actual measurement.

Yield Increased

It has been proved since certified seed was first used here that the farmer planting non-certified seed will get 60 sacks of tubers to the acre and his neighbor planting certified seed will yield 100 to 125 sacks under the same condition.

If anyone sees him, the county home would like to have him back. There they miss him, and are worried because he cannot be found. He was at his usual place for breakfast yesterday morning, and at 10 o'clock he passed the time of day with those who were at work in the fields. But when noon came, Mr. Wade did not appear for dinner.

Supt. H. J. Reiser and inmates searched all over the farm, up and down the road, among the bushes along the river, and even the stream itself. They called Judge J. G. Couch, who sent the sheriff, but not a trace of the old man could be found.

Mr. Wade an old prospector who froze his feet near Hilgard two years ago has been ill for the last year, and the superintendent is afraid he may have fallen somewhere and been unable to get up. Or wandered dazedly along the road until he was given a ride, and then been unable to tell who he was.

Red Cross Vessel Forced by Northern Troops to Turn Back

CIVILIANS REMAIN
IN STARVING TOWN

Intense Firing Within Walls of Wu Chang Unexplained—Authorities Are Silent.

HANKOW, Oct. 2 (AP)—A rescue launch towing two large lighters conspicuously bearing the Red Cross and other white flags and the names of the chamber of commerce interested sailed yesterday morning for Wu Chang to rescue women and children in that abandoned the rescue effort. There sieged city.

Nearby Wu Chang the northern troops, which are holding it, opened fire on the vessel despite an agreement to permit the women and children to evacuate rifle and machine gun fire compelled the ships to return to Hankow and were no casualties. Southern troops blockaded the city and there is intense firing among the civilians who are entirely without food. Heavy firing within the walls of Wu Chang of cannon, machine guns and rifles is unexplained, while the flames from three large fires are visible across the river in Hankow, clouds of smoke pour upward. Southern army officials profess ignorance of the cause of the firing but suggest it is possible there may be a revolt among the northern troops because of the serious situation among the defenders.

The southerners are making no attacks on Wu Chang but continuing their blockade policy.

AMERICANS SAFE

PEKING, Oct. 2 (AP)—Advisers from Hankow say that Bishop A. A. Gilman, one of the Americans marooned in the besieged city of Wu Chang has informed the U. S. consul that all Americans in Wu Chang are safe and are suffering no privations.

CANTONESE ALARMED

PEKING, Oct. 2 (AP)—Foreign dispatches from their Yangtze centers of operation indicate that the Cantonese are much alarmed by Sun Chui-Pang's thrust against their line of communication. The Cantonese have sent envoys to Sun's headquarters to sue for an armistice offering to withdraw from Kiangsi province, seat of the eastern war lord, now allied with the northern armies against the

100 Armed Men
Disturb Meeting
Of Ku Kluxers

GROTON, Mass., Oct. 2 (AP)—A pitched battle in which between 75 and 100 shots from rifles and pistols were believed to have been fired broke up a meeting of several hundred members of the Ku Klux Klan here early today. The klansmen, who were assembled in a field, were driven to cover of their automobiles when a party estimated at nearly 100 drove up and opened fire from behind trees and which felled across the highway.

The felled trees compelled klansmen to drive through fields to gain the roadway. Local police summoned the state police, but no casualties were noted. The ground was littered with glass from broken windshields.

JUDGE ADJOURNS
AIMEE HEARING

Testimony Will Be Resumed Monday, Presiding Jurist Declares

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 2 (AP)—The little theatre where the Aimee Semple McPherson court drama has been holding the boards during the last five days was dark today. An intermission in the preliminary hearing of the Angelus Temple pastor and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, on conspiracy charges, was called yesterday when Municipal Judge Samuel Blake adjourned the trial until next Monday.

The tiny courtroom, which had been packed to capacity during the opening scenes of the dramatic trial, was deserted today by all but a few attaches and a janitor. Yesterday's curtain dropped on opposing attorneys clashed over the admission of testimony concerning the finances of Angelus Temple. Deputy District Attorney E. J. Dempsey was reading from the transcript of testimony given before the county grand jury by Mrs. Kennedy. The pastor's mother had testified that Mrs. McPherson received for expenses the sum of \$25 a week and one Sunday's offerings of her congregation each month. Defense counsel W. I. Gilbert interrupted the reading with the objection that the matter was irrelevant. Judge Blake put an end to the argument by adjourning court.

TEAM MATES
TO VICTORY

Superb Twirling of Pennock Holds St. Louis Sluggers Helpless

WINNING SCORE
MADE IN SIXTH

Record Breaking Crowd of 65,000 Fans See the Americans Win in Yank Stadium.

YANKER STADIUM, NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—Herb Pennock held the Cardinals to three hits today while his Yankee team mates, led by Babe Ruth battled their way to a 2 to 1 victory over the National league champions in the opening game of the world's series.

The New York southpaw yielded his only run in the first inning on a double by Douthitt and scratch single by Bottomley. Thereafter he held the Cardinals hitless until the ninth, when Bottomley registered his second hit.

Sherdel's wildness in issuing three passes in the first inning handed the Yankees their first run, Combs tallying on an infield out, but a sharp batting attack in the sixth produced the winning run.

Ruth Starts Rally

Babe Ruth started the rally with a sharp single to left. He went to second on Mueller's mad sacrifice and raced home on Lou Gehrig's blazing single to right. Lazzeri got a blow on which Gehrig was trapped at third, and Lester Bell misused Dugan's grounder, but the Cardinal defense stopped further scoring.

Pennock, settling down after the first inning, permitted only one man to reach first until the eighth, when he pulled himself out of a bad hole. Passes to O'Farrell and Douthitt, mixed with a sacrifice by Thevenow, threatened damage, but Earl Combs came to the rescue to retire the side with a fine running catch of a fly by Holm, batting for Southworth.

Haines Replaces Sherdel

Sherdel, a left-handed erratic, pitched fairly good ball until he retired in the eighth in favor of a pinch hitter, Flowers. Jess Haines retired the Yankees in the eighth without much trouble.

While Ruth was a star in the Yankee attack, his famous rival, Rogers Hornsby, failed to scintillate. The Cardinal leader got the ball out of the infield only once in four times at bat.
