BREAKFAST—Halves of grapefruit, cereal, thin cream, crisp broiled bacon, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cream of mushroom soup, croutons, lettuce and graham bread sandwiches, baked peaches, cocoa.

DINNER—Boiled salmon with egg sauce, potatoes in parsley butter, jellied vegetable salad, cantaloupe mousse, vanilla cookies, bran bread, milk, coffee.

The small potatoes one is sure to find in the bottom of the basket are best to use in parsley butter.

Cantaloupe Mousse
One and 1/2 cups cantaloupe pulp, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatin, 4 tablespoons cold water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup granulated sugar, 2 cups whipping cream.

Soften gelatin in cold water for 10 minutes. Dissolve over boiling water. Add sugar, lemon juice and dissolve gelatin to melon pulp and stir until sugar is dissolved.
