BANK PLANS TO SHIP IN SEED SPUDS

a carload of certified seed, which cost him \$25 a ton, plus the freight. His crop was recently judged the best in the county by E. H. Jackson, crop specialist, and he will probably be repaid for the difference in the price he would have paid for seed bought locally, which would have cost him \$55 or \$60 a ton, County Agent H. G. Avery says.

Seeks Western, Redmond Seed.—The certified seed purchased by potato growers here comes from either Western or Redmond, Ore. Potato growers there keep the seed clean by planting hills of selected seed and by careful roguing out of all disease by going over the fields an average of five times during the season and pulling any off-type or diseased plants.

No potatoes are certified if more than five per cent disease is found, which is about as free of disease as is possible, it is said.

The seed does not stay clean of disease so it is necessary to ship in certified potatoes each year to keep the crop up to standard. None of the Grande Ronde valley farmers grow certified seed, although the fields of about McKenna, Mrs. Hattie Friesdorf and Kirk Willis have been certified by the crop specialist in the past. No crops here were certified this year, although Mr. White passed the standard test, which is 15 per cent pure.

Farmers in the valley wanting certified seed are asked to notify the bank. The price will probably be about \$50 a ton delivered and it may be less than that, Mr. Avery declares. The potatoes will be shipped at digging time and kept by the various farmers until planting time in the spring.

DREDGE SINKS.—SALEM, Ore., Oct. 2 (AP).—The Dayton Dredge, a private dredge that has been at work all summer clearing the channel of the Willamette river for navigation, yesterday sank to the bottom of the river at a point a few miles above Newberg, according to a report reaching here today. The dredge was operating under contract with the United States government.

TINNEY SERIOUSLY ILL.—DETROIT, Oct. 2 (AP).—Frank Tinney, comedian now starring here in Earl Carroll's vaudeville is seriously ill at his hotel. He is to be transferred to a hospital this afternoon. Tinney's pulse was reported as 120 and his condition as "extremely critical."

Aged Pioneers Of Cove Are on New Milestone

COVE, Oct. 2. (Special).—Two Cove pioneers celebrated their birthday anniversaries during the past week, one aged 84 and one 87. Samuel G. White, who has made his home at Cove for the past 46 years, was the older. He is a veteran of the Civil war and carries a mutilated hand as the result of his service. He is known and loved by everyone in the Cove vicinity.

Otha Eckerley, the other pioneer, has made his home at Cove since 1842. He was born at Lauen, Prussia, in 1839 and came to America at the age of 14 years. He crossed the plains to Oregon during the year 1863, spending six months in Baker valley and coming to Cove in 1868 where he has since lived.

Mr. Eckerley has been in poor health for the past year and a half, but this anniversary found him quite well again and able to take his daily walk to the post office, a distance of several blocks from his home. The day was passed quietly at home with his wife.

Big Eagle Crashes Into Airmail Plane

ELKO, Nev., Oct. 2 (AP).—Measuring nearly eight feet, from tip to tip, a huge golden eagle crashed into an onrushing government airmail plane near here yesterday causing his own immediate destruction and damaging the plane so badly that it is being held here for repairs.

Following the impact, said Pilot E. E. Mouton, the plane started to veer to the right and he could see that the front middle strut had been knocked out causing the front end of the wing to buckle up. The pilot was forced to use all his all-eron control to keep the plane from turning over. He was able to make a successful landing in spite of the damage.

EGG PRICES GO UP DURING WEEK

Butter Quotations Also Advance; Apples Prices Low

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2 (AP).—The week closed in the local produce market with an advance of 1 to 2c in egg prices.

There was also an advance of 1/2 to 1c on quotations on butter. Poultry closed firm, veal was advanced 1/2c to 16 1/2c a pound. This season has been notable for the abnormal crop of apples in Oregon and all apple producing states. Conditions of over-supply are responsible for many growers becoming indifferent to placing their fruit in storage in anticipation of higher prices. In some localities growers are neglecting to complete their picking and much of the fruit will become wasted.

Prices in the markets are extremely low for apples of ordinary grade. Hauling choice grades to local markets from \$1.00 a box upward. Fancy packed stock is higher.
