ONLY 2 SURVIVE
BUS-TRAIN CRASHDeath List at Eight This
Morning After Death
of Car Driver

WOODLAND, Cal., Oct. 2. (AP)—The death list growing out of the grade crossing crash of the Southern Pacific Overland Limited and a motor stage of the California Transit company at Dixon, yesterday, mounted to eight when H. H. Harr, of Berkeley, driver of the stage, died in the hospital here early today.

Of ten who occupied the bus when it was struck by the train only two, James A. Speer, of Watsonville, Cal., and Davis Kennedy, of Woodland, and Sacramento are still alive, and according to physicians, Speer has but a slight chance of recovery. He is in the hospital here.

Native Austrian
To Relate Story
At M. E. ServiceTwo Visitors Will Speak
From Local Pulpits
Sunday Evening

Two visitors of experience peculiarly interesting to church goers will speak from La Grande pulpits tomorrow. The Rev. P. G. Jurich, of Pasadena, California, a native of that part of Austria which since the World War has been Jugoslawia, will give the story of his life when he addresses the congregation of the First M. E. church Sunday evening. The Rev. Harry J. Elliott, evangelist and Bible student, will deliver both morning and evening sermons at the church of the Nazarenes.

Mr. Jurich's story is said to be an inspiration for young people whose way in life is strewn with difficulties. He was raised in a humble Austrian home. Coming to America, he availed himself of advantages the country afforded him as a naturalized citizen. After finishing the public schools, he attended the Ohio Wesleyan college, the Union College of Kentucky, the Bible college in Chicago and finished at the Pasadena university.

Special music will be offered in conjunction with Mr. Jurich's address.

Rally day will be observed in the Sunday school at 9:45 a. m., with H. E. Dixon in charge. Opening exercises of the adult department will be in the church auditorium. Juniors and Intermediates will have their exercises in the school auditorium at the same hour.

The Men's Forum will meet for class work in the church parlors at 10 a. m., with E. L. Towler as teacher. The Marybuds will meet in the choir room at the same hour.

A general assembly will unite all the departments at 10:45 a. m., in the main room for the rally day service, which will cluster around the subject, "The Church Beautiful." The meeting will be merged in the worship hour of the church.

A special number will be sung by the choir. Dr. Henry W. Parker, pastor, will deliver a short address.

The young people will meet in the lounge room at 6:30 p. m., to resume the work of the Epworth League.

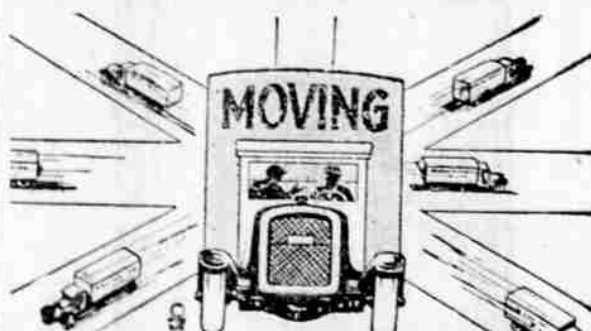
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
