Marie Prevost Scores in Film at Sherry's

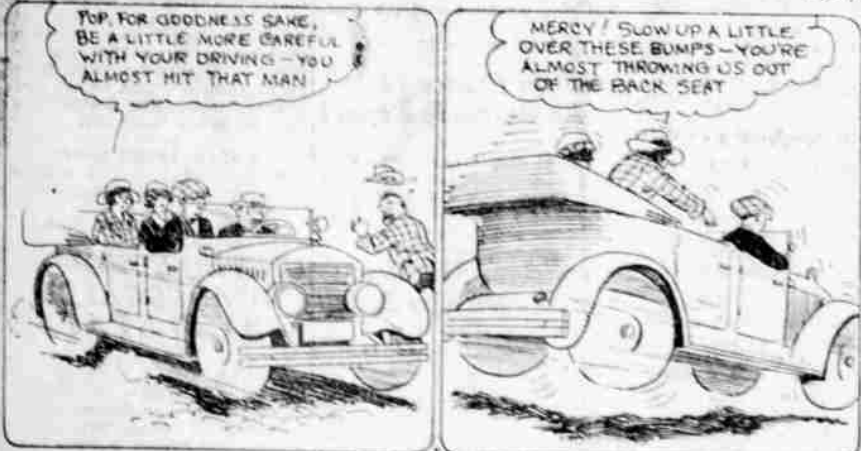
