LOS ANGELES, Oct. 5 (AP)—This is an era of "justifiable consolidation" of railroads, a special committee of bankers declared in a detailed report on "Interroad Consolidation" submitted Monday to the American Bankers association convention. "Now comes the time," the report says, "when the railroads must resume their processes of logical enlargement that the nation may keep step with its heritage of progress. Let us call it the era of justifiable consolidation or the adaptation to our common carriers of America's efficient principle of massed production, or more correctly transportation, in evolution toward massed distribution to care for the tremendous production developed by the unified industrial growth of this still young nation." "Consolidation, the report says, should be based on natural traffic and should not be compulsory.
