Fall Dress Suit Is Now Designed

As designed for women, the new fall dress suit is made of moire and crepe de chine. The skirt front and collar is of jade green georgette. Though ultra-modern the woman's dress suit is suggestive of picturesque bygone days. The skirt is slit up the center to reveal satin knee breeches when the wearer sits down. When the wearer stands upright, the suit would resemble a slim-fitting frock were it not for the coat tails.

Knee Watches
A new garter watch, has been introduced by the elite of Mayfair. They are about a half-inch in diameter and are "set" in jeweled garters about three quarters of an inch in width. The garters have a buckle and a strap, like an ordinary wrist watch, and fasten just below the wearer's right knee. The watch face appearing on the left-hand side.

Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Cassia melon, cereal, thin cream, broiled ham-burg, baked potatoes, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Potato soup, stuffed baked cucumbers, brown bread, baked apples with date and nut meringue, milk, tea.

DINNER—Stuffed shoulder of mutton, succotash, scalloped okra and tomatoes, sliced peaches with boiled custard, two egg sponge cake, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

"Yearling" mutton should be chosen for the dinner meat. Trim off fat carefully and be sure there is no tissue-like covering remaining on the roast when ready for the oven. Any well seasoned bread stuffing is good, although an oyster forcemeat is preferred for a more elaborate meal.

Scalloped Okra and Tomatoes
One quart okra pods, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons sugar, 3 tablespoons butter, 2 cups sliced tomatoes, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 4 cup bread crumbs from soft part of loaf.

Wash okra and remove stem ends of pods. Cut the pods crosswise in thin slices. Cover with boiling water, add 1 teaspoon salt and parboil for ten minutes. Drain. Add tomatoes, salt, sugar, butter and onion. Mix thoroughly and turn into a well buttered baking dish. Sprinkle thickly with bread crumbs, dot with bits of butter and bake in a hot oven for 35 minutes. (Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)
